EFFECTIVENESS OF SEVERAL MULCHING METHODS FOR ORGANIC VEGETABLE GARDENING

LLOYD R. GRABLE Citrus Institute Florida Southern College Lakeland, FL 33801

The four techniques of mulching that were used on cabbage grown during the winter are clear plastic, pine straw, news-

paper, and an annual ryegrass living mulch. The control was no mulch. The speaker suggested that there was a tendency for heat to accumulate underneath the clear plastic. With the newspaper mulch, he suggested that dyes could prove to be harmful when they ran off. It was interesting to note that in the results that were presented, the control group did not vary significantly with the mulches.

THE RELANDSCAPING OF SOUTH DADE COUNTY

In August of 1992, Hurricane Andrew swept through south Florida, taking with it most of the beautiful natural and manmade landscapes. When homeowners finally had the time and money, a massive relandscaping project began. Homeowners and garden center employees were interviewed to see what plants were being used.

Annuals were being planted heavily to provide color to the otherwise bleak surroundings. Large trees were also planted to restore the protection and privacy that were removed by the storm. Fruit trees, vines, and other fast growing or dense plants were used.

Although, most of the yards were not destroyed by the hurricane itself, cleanup and repair efforts took their toll on much of the turf in the area. Because of this, Floratam was also planted heavily. Due to the financial impact on the area, there have been many inquiries into xeriscaping and use of landscapes that are more energy efficient.

RESPONSE TO: SPREAD OF TRISTEZA AND THE BROWN CITRUS APHID IN THE CARIBBEAN BASIN—A POTENTIAL DUAL THREAT TO THE FLORIDA CITRUS INDUSTRY

Many hours of research, many lines of print, and many more dollars have been, and will be used, to predict the arrival of the brown citrus aphid (BCA). Its movement has been tracked through Mexico, the Caribbean basin, and now its arrival to Cuba. Its movement, in itself, is not so remarkable. It is the threat of the introduction of the severe strain of the citrus tristeza virus (CTV) that worries growers and has prompted a flurry of activity in the research community.

Assuming the arrival of the BCA and severe strains of CTV are inevitable, a program for first detection is required. Such a program will require large amounts of funding, coming from growers and taxpayers. Efficient use of these funds is paramount, since the coffers are not bottomless. Understanding the most probable movement of the vector, its migrating limitations, and the likely hosts for its transportation will allow for effective expenditure of funds. Such precautions will not, in all likelihood, stop the introduction of either the BCA or the spread of severe strains of CTV. It will deter, or at least delay, for a time, the introduction, allowing researchers time to find effective means for control for both vector and virus.

POTENTIAL OF FEIJOA

This presentation outlined the use of the Feijoa as both a fruit crop and an ornamental. The species is native to Uruguay. The fruit is known for its fine flavor and good keeping quality. The shrub is known to be quite hardy, but won't flower or

bear fruit below St. Petersburg, which is thought to be due to a lack of adequate chill hours. The Feijoa is currently propagated from seed but attempts are being made to successfully graft. The two most common varieties planted are 'Task' and 'Coolidge', and the largest plantings are in the Brooksville area. Although Feijoa is of little value as a fruit crop in southern Florida, it does exhibit good potential as a landscape hedge plant.

IS IT TIME TO DEVELOP A NEW SYSTEM FOR GROWING STRAWBERRIES IN FLORIDA?

For the last twenty yesrs, Florida strawberry growers have been using the raised bed plasticulture system. Craig T. Chandler is proposing a system that could eliminate most of the problems that exist today with the present system.

Today's strawberry production problems are ones that are in need of some changes. Chandler described seven main problems with the old system. They are: the plastic used on the beds and the disposable problem of the plastic; methylbromide, which will eventually be removed from the market;

availability of water; the use of fungicides and their availability; labor; shelf life of the strawberry varieties; and the last problem is that strawberries are a horizontal system and they take a lot of space.

Column growing is now under experimentation according to Chandler. His proposal is to have a system that is vertical. The advantage of this system is that you can get more fruit per acre, requires no plastic film, there are better spraying conditions, may require less labor, and the fruit can be transported immediately.

In summary, Chandler says that the old system is no longer good and that his proposal for a new system is one that has many advantages. If this works, it seems possible that larger crops of strawberries can be produced on less land.

INTERNATIONAL RESEARCH LINKAGES BENEFIT FLORIDA CITRUS INDUSTRY

The global citrus industry is constantly bombarded with new information and innovation. New grove caretaking methods are being utilized in all citrus-producing countries. New citrus pests are being discovered and studied as well. Dr. Walter J. Kender suggests that citrus researchers and scientists interact with scientists from other countries. He cited several examples showing how sharing information with other countries has been of help to the U.S. citrus industry. Dr. Kender expects that sharing information in the future will be a great benefit to the industry as a whole.

ORGANOGENESIS IN TISSUE CULTURES OF AVERRHOA CARAMBOLA L. 'ARKIN'

The purpose of this experiment was to perform the regeneration of carambola (Averrhoa carambola) in vitro. The carambola or star fruit now has large economic importance in Florida. Carambola cultivars are usually propagated by veneer grafting onto seedling rootstocks. Carambola cultivars have different oxalic acid levels. 'Arkin' is a sweet variety that is low in oxalic acid. Success in vitro propagation of 'Arkin' could be very important in the availability of new cultivars. Vitro propagation has not been very successful in the Oxalidaceae family (carambola's family). In this study an identical match

of the variety 'Arkin' was attempted using vitro propagation from somatic tissues. For preparation of explants, leaflets were taken from new vegetative flushes of container-grown 'Arkin' in mid-summer.

After 26 weeks shoot regeneration was evaluated. The study showed that shoot organogenesis from callus of young leaves ('Arkin') depends on a number of factors. The most important factors are (a) the balance of plant growth regulators for callus initiation and shoot induction; (b) leaflets should be selected in summer months since earlier studies have shown to be unsuccessful in the winter and (c) cytokinin preconditioning was a necessary factor for success in vitro regeneration.

THE INFLUENCE OF CULTIVAR AND HIGH NITROGEN AND POTASSIUM FERTILIZATION ON FRUIT QUALITY TRAITS OF YOUNG ORANGE TREES

There have been substantial increases in Hamlin, Valencia, and Navel oranges since 1986. Ambersweet planting began in 1990. Growers have these trees on a young tree fertilization program which usually have high levels of nitrogen and potassium. This in conjunction with supplemental irrigation provides for maximum growth of young trees. These high nutrition levels promote vigorous vegetative growth and poor quality.

The emphasis of the grower has been shifting from fruit for processing to fresh fruit. There is a problem with this because

fruit quality on young trees is poor, especially on varieties such as Navel, Valencia, and Ambersweet. Young Ambersweet has been extremely poor quality but is beginning to improve. For this change of emphasis to work, the growers must have better management practices. They must consider cultivar, tree age, desired vegetative growth, and production potential. They should change from a young tree program to a bearing tree program by the time the tree reaches seven years of age. This should promote better fruit quality since the maturity standards were developed using fruit from trees eight years or older.

In order for growers to effectively produce high quality fruit for fresh use they must make sound cultural management decisions especially concerning fertilization in order to produce a good quantity of high quality fruit.

ECONOMIC AND ENVIRONMENTAL ADVANTAGES AND DISADVANTAGES OF GRASS CLIPPINGS

A report that I had particular interest in was on grass clippings. A two-year study was done on the economic and environmental advantages and disadvantages of collecting grass clippings and mulching with lawn mowers. It clearly appeared advantageous to use mowers with mulching blades instead of collecting clippings with rear or side baggers to be

collected by sanitary officials. Those who keep their grass clippings for landfills increase the landfills greatly each year.

Those involved in the study were encouraged to not collect their grass clippings and were provided with mowers with mulching blades. After two years their studies found a definite advantage in mulching. One advantage is the obvious reduction of landfill space occupied by grass clippings. Another advantage was the improvement of the soil organic matter from the decayed grass clippings. Other clear advantages of mulching were the decrease of wear and tear on lawn equipment and the reduction of cost for trash bags. Mulching mowers also showed an increase in gas mileage.

IMPACT OF HURRICANE ANDREW ON TROPICAL FRUIT ACREAGE IN DADE COUNTY

Hurricane Andrew hit Dade County on August 24, 1992. It devastated much of the tropical fruit crops. Growers observed

there were more trees in some groves remaining upright after the storm than others. It was determined that the trees that were topped and hedged had a higher survival rate than those that were not hedged or topped. The results encouraged growers to practice tree site control to decrease tree damage during a hurricane.

IMPACT OF HURRICANE ANDREW ON TROPICAL FRUIT ACREAGES IN DADE COUNTY

The tropical fruit crops in Dade County experienced severe damage from Hurricane Andrew that occurred on August 24, 1992. Damage was so extensive that the biennial survey of the Florida Agricultural Statistics Service was postponed. The destruction of avocados, limes and mangoes was phenomenal.

The avocado trees suffered some losses but have been rehabilitated within the year following the storm. Marcotted trees that blew over were pruned and pulled back up. Budded trees that were blown apart at the bud union were replanted.

Of the tropical fruits affected, limes suffered the most. Many of the lime trees were literally wiped out. The acreage in limes dropped from 6,071 acres in 1990 to 1,668 in 1992. Lime production will require the planting of many more trees in the near future.

Mango trees were decreased by forty-two percent as a result of Andrew. In acreage, mangoes were reduced by nine percent from 1990 to 1992. It is estimated that thirty-five percent of the trees, five years or older, were blown over during the hurricane. In the next few years a reduction in yields will occur as a result of the hurricane.

It is going to take years of rehabilitation before this major tropical fruit area in Dade County will return to its past production.

CONSERV II RECLAIMED WATER FOR CITRUS IRRIGATION

The use of municipal wastewater on crops intended for human consumption is a concern of many consumers, so research was conducted to find the long term results of applying municipal wastewater to agriculture crops. Mature citrus trees were used in Lake and Orange counties. Tests were conducted for a six-year period before a conclusion was reached. The municipal wastewater was compared with well water in terms of soil water content, soil chemical analysis, leaf mineral status and fruit quality.

The municipal wastewater produced a higher mineral residue in the soil, altered the leaf mineral content, the trees seemed to be healthier, and weeds were a greater problem as compared with that of the well-watered trees. Municipal wastewater can supply a citrus tree with all the needed P, Mg, and B. However, the amount of N, P, and Ca in the soil was not increased enough to show a difference from that of the well water. The most important factor in using municipal wastewater is that it is free water. Free water results in more watering which has caused more weeds, larger fruit and more fruit.

After the six years of study, it was found that the municipal wastewater will have no great effect on the final product, the fruit.

EVAPORATION AND WIND: FRIEND OR FOE IN COLD PROTECTION

The condition of 66 Ambersweet/Sour Orange, 198 Orlando Tangelo/Carrizo and 197 Robinson/Carrizo planted 15×20 feet in April, 1990 was recorded after the March freeze of

1993. These trees which were planted on the main campus of the University of Florida had one to three in-tree sprinklers per tree, while others had under-tree sprinklers. High winds, low dewpoints and temperatures down to 26°F led to predictions that the irrigated half would receive more damage than the non-irrigated half. However, the sprinkled blocks did not receive more damage than the non-sprinkled blocks. Certain roles of wind and humidity may deserve more attention.

BIONOMICS AND CONTROL OF THE ASIAN CITRUS LEAFMINER IN FLORIDA

Jorge E. Pena of the IFAS, Tropical Research and Education Center, University of Florida, Homestead, presented a paper on the topic of bionomics and control of the Asian citrus leafminer, *Phyllocnistis citrella*. It was first detected in May of 1993 on the southern tip of Florida. The citrus leafminer infestations were observed on upper and lower surfaces of leaves of several

citrus cultivars, including sweet oranges, lemon, sour oranges, and on grapefruit which is apparently the preferred host. His data indicated that four or more leafminers on one leaf was considered heavy infestation. The adult citrus leafminer should be targeted and multiple sprays in conjunction with rotation of pesticides are helpful in controlling the population of the citrus leaf miner. Among the biological controls for this leafminer were spiders, ants, and other parasites. The impact of the citrus leafminer on citrus is not fully known at this time, but research of controls and results of damage from this pest are ongoing.

IMPACT OF HURRICANE ANDREW ON TROPICAL ACREAGE IN DADE COUNTY

Everyone in Florida will undoubtedly be talking about Hurricane Andrew for years to come, for many reasons. It was the costly hurricane of all time, costing insurance agencies billions of dollars and growers most or all of their groves. The destruction of avocados, limes and mangoes in particular were hit very hard.

The replanting of avocado groves and the rehabilitation has already begun. Of the three, lime trees undoubtedly suffered the worst. They were almost completely wiped out. Lime acreage was decreased by over 70% and is expected to be higher before the replanting is completed. Mangoes are expected to substain losses of over 40%.

The losses for limes, avocados, and mangoes will not signal the end of the tropical fruit industry in south Florida, but it will take many years and even more dollars to reestablish, assuming that we can rebuild without any other natural disasters in the near future.

ARE WE APPLYING TOO MUCH NITROGEN ON OUR RIDGE CITRUS?

It is no secret that nitrogen is the most important element when dealing with growth and yield of a citrus tree. The old school of thought has been "more is better" so the grower piled on as much nitrogen as he could afford hoping he/she can get a vigorous tree with high yields. However, recent studies have shown that applying excess nitrogen is not worth the cost, especially in the ridge area.

The deep, well-drained and sandy condition of the ridge and the high amount of rainfall in the summer results in increased leaching of nitrates in central Florida. If a grower applies an excess of nitrogen on his/her grove, it is wasted as the extra amounts are simply leached below the root zone before the tree can use it. This extra nitrogen costs money, time, and effort to apply, thus increasing production costs with little or no increase in profits.

Another problem of excess leaching of nitrogen is ground-water contamination. The ridge soils are deep and quickly drain to the aquifer which is Florida's main source of drinking water. Recently, groundwater quality has been deteriorating due to the increase in nitrate levels. Nitrates are a human contaminant and is a serious problem considering the rapid population growth in this state.

The solution to these problems are simple. We must find a happy medium of nitrogen application that maximizes uptake by the plant and minimizes leaching from the root zone. Recent breakthroughs in formulation and application of fertilizers has helped reduce nitrate loss through leaching. Research continues to find ways to avoid leaching while not sacrificing tree and fruit quality.

MANAGEMENT OF INSECT PESTS OF SQUASH

Susan E. Webb of the Central Florida Research and Education Center gave a presentation on how well standard chemical insecticides, detergent, *Bacillus thuringensis*, and mineral oil control pests of squash. These were tested either individually or in combination during the fall of 1991 and the fall of

1992. Aphids, sweet potato whitefly, pickleworm, and melonworm were the insects that these pesticides targeted. It was found that the combination of BT and mineral oil did not have an effect on aphids, while everything else was quite effective. Everything appeared to be reasonably effective on whitefly adults but only a few were effective on the eggs. BT alone worked best on the melonworm and pickleworm. In general it was found that using any of these pesticides alone or in combination lessened the population of pests on squash.

BROWN CITRUS APHID AND CTV VIRUS

During my stay at the Florida State Horticultural Society Meetings in Miami, I had the opportunity to attend many papers. Of all the ones I attended, I found the ones dealing with biological control the most interesting.

In order to focus on one seminar I chose the series of seminars dealing with the brown citrus aphid and its association with the CTV virus. This is an exciting area of research and shows great promise. Specifically, I found the race scientists face against the introduction of this pest from Mexico to be a

unique challenge. The statistical analysis of projected populations in the state of Florida and its impact on the Florida citrus industry prompted me to think of the seriousness of the problem. As I talked to people from this and associated areas I discovered I had a real interest in this discipline and I have actually considered this type of research to be part of my possible graduate program.

All the experiences were helpful to gain a greater appreciation of the enormity and importance of horticulture to the state of Florida. The people I had a chance to talk to gave me valuable insight to opportunities in the various areas. My discovery of an interest in biological control may have a great impact on the focus of my education.

FACTORS AFFECTING GRAPE SOMATIC EMBRYOGENESIS

A short summary of the presentation by M. Compton and D. J. Gray entitled, "Effects of Sucrose, ABA, and MGBG on Grape Somatic Embryogenesis."

The production of somatic embryos for their use in synthetic seed production for rapid clonal propagation has drawn much interest as tissue culture techniques have advanced through the years. In grape, the production of virus-free synthetic seed could enhance uniformity in the field and lower labor costs associated with propagation through grafting.

This paper dealt with tissue culture techniques and media formulations in order to increase somatic embryogenesis in grape culture. The tested effects of varying levels of sucrose, from 60 to 180 g/l; of ABA, from 0.1 to 100 μ M; and of MGBG, from 0.0 to 10 μ M.

It was found that sucrose at levels of 90 to 120 g/l increased the number of somatic embryos that resembled zygotic embryos; these levels also reduced embryo viability. The MGBG, however inhibited somatic embryogenic cell growth.

These results suggest that medium high levels of sucrose can promote somatic embryo formation and that possibly ABA could be used in conjunction to make more reliable and stable synthetic seed. This could be an area for further research.

BY-LAWS

FLORIDA STATE HORTICULTURAL SOCIETY, INC. A FLORIDA NON-PROFIT CORPORATION

ARTICLE I.

NAME

The name of the Corporation shall be Florida State Horticultural Society, Inc.

ARTICLE II.

PRINCIPAL OFFICE

The principal office of this Corporation shall be at 111 Leslie Avenue, Winter Haven, Polk County, Florida 33880.

ARTICLE III.

PURPOSES

A. To serve as an information center to collate, enhance and disseminate information in the broad field of Florida horticulture.

B. To create and publish the proceedings of the Florida State Horticultural Society to advance Florida horticulture.

C. For the advancement of charity education or any other related or corresponding charitable purpose by the distribution of its funds for such purposes.

D. The advancement and development of horticulture in the State of Florida.

E. To operate exclusively in any other manner for such charitable and educational purposes as will qualify it as an exempt organization under Section 501 C (5) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1954 as amended or under any corresponding provisions of any subsequent federal tax laws covering the distributions to organizations qualified as tax exempt organizations under the Internal Revenue Code as amended including private foundations and private operating foundations.

ARTICLE IV

PROHIBITED ACTIVITIES

Notwithstanding any other provision of these by-laws or the Articles of Incorporation this Corporation shall not conduct or carry on any activities not permitted to be conducted or carried on by any organization that shall be exempt under Section 501 C (3) or Section 501 C (5) of the Internal Revenue Code and its regulations, now existing or hereafter amended.

ARTICLE V.

MEMBERSHIP

There shall be four classifications of membership, all of which carry voting privileges; a. Annual, b. Patron, c. Student, d. Honorary (nothing in this Article shall be construed as operating against or canceling the privileges of life members accepted as life members prior to the adoption of these by-laws).

Any individual, corporate entity or partnership interested in the development and the advancement of horticulture in society shall be eligible for membership provided they agree to be bound by the Articles of Incorporation and By-Laws thereof and by such rules and regulations as may from time to time be adopted by the Board of Directors of this organization and upon the payment of the proper dues as hereinafter provided.

Section 3. Classification of members.

A. Annual Members. Annual members shall be full members of the Corporation and shall pay an annual membership fee of \$25.00.

B. Patron Members. Patron members shall be full members of the Corporation and shall pay an annual membership fee of \$100.00.

C. Student Members. Student members shall be full members of the Corporation and shall pay annual membership fee of \$5.00 per year.

D. Honorary Members. Honorary members shall not be required to pay annual membership fees and shall include those persons who prior to the adoption of these by-laws were accorded the privilege of life membership.

Section 4. Duration. All classes of membership save and except honorary shall be one year in duration and shall be required to be renewed annually by the payment of the required dues. Dues shall be payable in advance on the last day of December in each fiscal year, and will be considered delinquent after that date.

Section 5. The right of a member to vote and all of his or her other rights and interests in the organization shall cease on the termination of

his or her membership. No member shall be entitled to share in distribution of the Corporate assets upon the dissolution of the organization's corporate structure.

Section 6. Application of membership. A prospective member shall be eligible for membership upon the approval of his or her application and

payment of the applicable membership fees.

Section 7. Membership Committee. The membership coordinating committee shall consist of a chairman appointed by the chairman of the board of directors, the chairman of the student affairs committee and one other member and shall have the duties of coordinating with the membership chairman of each section to develop plans for soliciting new members throughout the year and assuring that the needs of the membership are being met by the services and activities of the society.

Section 8. Resignation. Any member may resign from the organization by delivering a written resignation to the President or Secretary.

Section 9. Default and Termination. If any member shall default in the payment of dues for a period of three months from the commencement of the fiscal or calendar year for which said dues are payable his or her membership shall be terminated. Provided that notice of such action and delinquency shall have been mailed to the member at his last known address at least 15 (fifteen) days prior to the date that such action is taken and payment is not made in full before termination.

Section 10. Reinstatement. A member who has resigned in good standing may apply to the membership coordinating chairman for reinstatement.

ARTICLE VI.

MEMBERSHIP MEETING

Section 1. Annual meeting. The membership shall hold annual meetings on or about the first week of November each year at the principal office of the Corporation or such other place or places as may be determined by the Board of Directors. The date, time and place shall be set by the Board of Directors. Notice of such meeting shall be given to all members, officers and directors at their last known address at least 10 (ten) days prior to the date of the meeting. An agenda for such meeting shall be included in such notice.

Section 2. Special meetings. Special meeting of the members may be called at any time by the President or Secretary or by any 2 (two) members of the Board of Directors. Such meeting must be called by the President or Secretary upon receipt of the written request of 1/3 (one-third) of the members. Written notice of such meeting, stating the time, place and purposes shall be served by mail upon each member of the organization not less than 10 (ten) days nor more than 15 (fifteen) days before such meeting.

Section 3. Quorum. At any meeting fifty members or more present shall constitute a quorum for all purposes, and the act of the majority of these members present at which there is a quorum shall be the act of the entire membership, except as maybe otherwise provided for by statute or by the charter of the organization. In the absence of a quorum, or when a quorum is present, a meeting may be adjourned by the vote of a majority of the members present in person or by proxy without the notice other than by announcement at the meeting and without further notice to the absent members. At any adjourned meeting at which the quorum shall be present any business may be transacted which might have been transacted at the meeting as originally notified.

Section 4. Voting Rights. At every meeting of members, each member entitled to vote, shall be entitled to vote in person. The vote for the election of directors and on any question before the meeting when deemed necessary by either the president or the secretary shall be by ballot. All elections and all questions to be decided at such meeting shall be by majority vote of the members present and entitled to vote.

Section 5. Order of Business. The order of business at membership meetings shall be as follows:

A. Calling of the roll of members.

- B. Proof of notice of meeting or waiver of notice submitted.
- C. Reading of the minutes of the previous meeting.
- D. Reports of officers.
- E. Reports of committees.
- F. Election of Board of Directors.
- G. Unfinished business.
- H. New business.

Any question concerning the priority of the business to be conducted before the meeting shall be decided by the Chairman of the meeting. The order of business may be amended or changed at any meeting by majority of vote of the members present at such meeting.

Section 6. Informal actions by members. Any action that may be taken at a membership meeting may be taken without a meeting if a consent in writing, setting forth the action, shall be signed by the holders of outstanding memberships having not less than a minimum number of votes that would be necessary to authorize or take such action at a meeting at which all members entitled to vote thereon were present and voted and filed with the Secretary of the Corporation. Within ten (10) days after obtaining such authorization by written consent, notice must be given to those members who have not consented in writing to such action taken.

ARTICLE VII.

BOARD OF DIRECTORS

Section 1. General management of the affairs of the organization shall be vested in the Board of Directors.

Section 2. The number of Directors shall not be less than three (3) nor more than twenty-one (21) which may be changed from time to time by amendment of these By-Laws in the manner provided herein with the initial board to consist of fourteen (14) persons.

Section 3. The Election of Directors. The Board of Directors shall be elected by the members of the organization at the annual meeting of the members by a majority vote of the members present at such meeting as provided in Section 1 of Article VI hereinabove.

Section 4. Duties and Powers of the Directors. The Board of Directors shall have the authority to:

- A. Hold meetings at times and places that may be deemed proper and necessary.
 - B. Admit, suspend or expel members.
- C. Appoint committees on particular subjects from members of the Board or from the membership of the organization.
 - D. Audit bills and disburse the funds of the organization.
- E. Print and circulate documents and publish articles, pamphlets and papers.
- F. Carry on correspondence, communicate with other associations with the same interests.
 - G. Employ agents.
- H. Devise and carry into execution such other measures as deemed proper and expedient to promote the objectives of the organization and protect the interests and welfare of the members.
- I. Remove any or all of the officers of the organization with due cause prior to the termination date of such office.
- J. Elect substitute directors in the event any Director resigns or is removed from office prior to the termination date from such office.
- K. Terminate the contract of any firm, individual or any other entity employed by the organization to perform any and all nature of services to the organization.
- L. Employ, retain or terminate any employee of the Corporation who it deems appropriate.

ARTICLE VIII.

MEETINGS OF THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS

Section 1. Annual Meetings. The annual meeting with the Board of Directors shall be held in the month of January of each year at the principal office of the corporation or such other place or places as may be determined by the President.

Section 2. Special Meetings. Special meetings of the Board of Directors may be called by the President or by any two (2) members of the Board of Directors. Written notice shall be given stating the purpose of such meeting and shall be delivered to each member of the Board of Directors or mailed to the last known address of such Director at least five (5) days prior to such meeting date.

Section 3. Regular Meetings. The Board of Directors shall hold regular meetings at such time and place as may be approved by a majority of the Board. A majority of the board shall constitute a quorum. The Board may be canvassed by mail and vote by ballot in like manner.

Section 4. Absences. Should any member of the Board of Directors absent himself without just cause from three (3) consecutive meetings of the board without notifying the President or Secretary for his/her reason for doing so and if his/her reason should not be accepted by the members of the board, his/her seat on the Board may be declared vacant and the board may vote to select a substitute Director from the membership of the organization to serve the remainder of his/her term.

Section 5. Resignation. Any Director may resign at any time by giving written notice of such resignation to the Board of Directors.

Section 6. Removal, Termination of Office. Any one or more of the Directors may be removed with cause at any time by the Board of Directors in the same manner set forth for voting on any issue hereinabove.

Section 7. Delegation of Authority. Board of Directors shall delegate authority to any executive committee created by it to conduct the business of the organization in accordance with the policies prescribed by the Board of Directors from time to time.

Section 8. Eligibility for Membership. Only members in good standing shall be qualified to become members of the Board of Directors.

Section 9. Election of Directors. The President shall appoint a nominating committee consisting of not less than two (2) persons from each section, one of whom shall be the most recent past sectional vice-president able to serve. This committee shall at each annual meeting make nominations for officers and other members of the Board of Directors for the ensuing year provided the members representing various sections shall seek advise of each section in open meetings concerning the nomination of Vice-President elect for that section. Such nominations by the nominating committee, however, shall not preclude nominations from the floor. The President shall designate a member of the Board of Directors as chairman of the nominating committee.

- 1. At the annual meeting held after the adoption of the By-Laws an election shall be held by the members of no less than fourteen (14) members. The editor, program coordinator, secretary and treasurer shall each be elected for a five (5) year term. A Vice-President elect from each section shall be elected for a one (1) year term. The Vice-President elect shall succeed to the office of vice-president of the section at the beginning of the second fiscal year following his or her election. Two members at-large shall be elected for (2) two years term on an alternate basis. Insofar as practical the board shall arrange that no more than two (2) of offices of editor, program coordinator, secretary and treasurer terminate at the same time.
- 2. At all elections for members of the Board of Directors, only active voting members in good standing may be qualified to cast their votes for such Directors. The installation of office of those Directors who have been elected in any part of the year shall be held on the 1st day of January immediately following the date of the annual meeting at which such new members of the Board were elected.

Section 10. Order of Business. The order of business of the Board of Directors meeting shall be the same as provided in Section 5 of Article VI except that the election shall be for the officers of the Corporation and for members of the executive committee.

Section 11. Inspectors of Election. The directors present at any meeting of the Board of Directors may elect or appoint two (2) persons who need not be Directors to act as inspectors of election for the purpose of tabulating and counting the ballots in the election for officers or the voting on any other issue before such meeting.

Section 12. Directors shall receive no compensation for their services. Section 13. The directors of the corporation shall not be personally liable for its debts, liabilities or other obligations.

ARTICLE IX

OFFICERS

Section 1. The officers of the Corporation: Chairman of the board who is the immediate past president, President, six sectional Vice-Presidents, as more particularly hereinafter described, Secretary, Treasurer, Editor, Program Coordinator and two members at-large and such other officers with such powers and duties not inconsistent with these By-Laws as may be appointed and determined by the Board of Directors from time to time.

Section 2. Term of Office. The terms of the office for the Editor, Program Coordinator, Secretary and Treasurer shall be five (5) years on a staggered basis with no member serving more than two (2) terms in such offices. All other offices shall be for a term of one (1) year except the members at-large which serve alternative two-year terms elected in alternate years.

Section 3. Installation and Commencement of Duties. The officers newly elected at the annual meeting and the Board of Directors shall be installed and take office on the first day of the year immediately following the date of the annual meeting as established by the Board of Directors simultaneously with the installation of the incoming Board of Directors.

Section 4. Election. The officers of the Corporation shall be elected by the Board of Directors in the following manner:

A. The President shall appoint a nominating committee consisting of not less than two (2) persons from each section, one of whom shall have been the most recent past sectional Vice-President able to serve. This committee at each annual meeting shall make nominations for officers and Directors for the ensuing year provided the members representing

various sections shall seek advice of each section in open meetings concerning the nomination of Vice-President elect for that section. Such nomination shall not preclude nominations from the floor. The names of the proposed officers shall be submitted to the board at least one (1) month prior to the annual meeting of the board.

Section 5. Consent to Election. Only those persons who have signified their consent to serve if elected shall be nominated for or elected to such office.

Section 6. Multiple Offices. No person shall be on the ballot for more than one (1) office.

Section 7. Vacancies in Office. If the office of Chairman of the Board or President become vacant by reason of termination or resignation during the term of office, the Board of Directors shall select a successor to succeed to the office for the unexpired term. Vacancies in all other elected offices shall be filled for the unexpired term by the Board of Directors. During the absence or the inability of the President to serve, the chairman of the Board of Directors shall temporarily fulfill the role of President.

Section 8. Duties of Officers.

A. Chairman of the Board. It shall be the duty of the Chairman of the Board to chair the Board meetings; appoint all standing committees as prescribed by the board, and he or she shall perform such other duties as may be delegated to him or her by the Board of Directors.

B. President. It shall be the duty of the President as a Chief Executive Officer to be the official head of the Society and preside at the general session of the annual meeting. The President shall be directly responsible to the Board of Directors and may be removed from office for cause by an affirmative vote of a majority of the full Board of Directors. The President shall have the power to sign all contracts and any other obligations on behalf of the Corporation approved by the Board of Directors. The President shall be exofficio member of all sections and committees except the nominating committee. The President shall select all inspectors of election. He/she shall be authorized to sign checks on the Corporation's bank account. In addition the President shall have and perform such other duties as may be delegated to him/her by the Board of Directors.

C. Sectional Vice-Presidents. The sectional Vice-Presidents shall be members of the Board of Directors. The sections comprising the Corporate body shall be:

Citrus Section, Vegetable Section, Krome Memorial Institute (tropical and subtropical fruits), Ornamental Section, Handling and Processing Section, Garden and Landscape Section. The Vice-President of the citrus section shall assume the duties of the President in the temporary absence of the President. The Vice-Presidents of the various sections shall preside over the particular sections of which they are representatives at the annual meeting.

D. Secretary. Secretary shall record all records of the meetings of the Board of Directors and shall be responsible except as may otherwise be designated by the By-Laws for recording and keeping proceedings of the annual meeting. The Secretary shall likewise issue and mail out statements of dues to the membership, notices of meetings, and perform such other duties as are designated by the Board of Directors.

E. Treasurer. The Treasurer shall be responsible for all funds paid into the corporation and shall issue and countersign all vouchers paying bills or accounts against the Corporation. The Treasurer shall be placed under bond in an amount determined by the Board of Directors, premium which shall be paid by the Corporation. Current financial records shall be kept at all times and reports on the financial status of the Corporation shall be submitted at all meetings of the Board of Directors and membership with copies to be provided for the President's file. The books of the Corporation shall be delivered to his/her successor immediately following the termination of the office and election of a new Treasurer.

F. Editor and Program Coordinator. The Editor and Program Coordinator shall perform such duties as may be prescribed and authorized by the Board of Directors.

G. Reports of Officers. All officers shall perform the duties prescribed and assigned to them by the President from time to time and as outlined herein and delivered to their successor all official material not later than thirty (30) days following the election and installation of their successors.

H. Compensation. Officers of the Corporation shall receive no compensation for their services.

ARTICLE X COMMITTEES

Corporation shall have such committees as shall be necessary for the conduct of the organization's business and to carry out its objects and purposes. All committees shall serve for one (1) year. The committees shall be as established by the Board of Directors and initially are as follows:

1. Nominating Committee. There shall be a nominating committee established as provided above and appointed by the President who shall designate a member of the committee as chairman and shall have such duties as above provided.

2. Membership Coordinating Committee. The chairman of the Board of Directors shall appoint a membership coordinating committee that shall consist of a chairman, the chairman of the student affairs committee and one other member. Within each section, the sectional Vice-President shall appoint a sectional membership chairman and designate a chairman thereof. The chairman of the sectional membership committee shall work closely with membership coordinating committee to develop plans for securing new members throughout the year and ensuring that the needs of the membership are being meet by the services and activities of the Society. The chairman of the membership coordinating committee shall meet with the Board of Directors when requested by the chairman and shall make recommendations to the Board of Directors on membership enlargement, participation and related activities.

3. Program Committee. The Vice-Presidents of the various sections shall constitute a program committee of which the President shall be the chairman, the program coordinator, the vice-chairman and secretary and

treasurer shall be exofficio members.

- 4. Student Affairs Committee. The chairman of the Board of Directors shall appoint a student affairs committee comprised of one (1) member each from the faculties of all educational institutions in the State of Florida offering a four (4) year horticultural program leading to a bachelor's degree, two (2) members representing different industries and two (2) student members from different institutions. Membership of this committee shall be initially appointed for one (1) to three (3) year terms and designated on a rotating basis so after the third year all members will be appointed for a three (3) year term with no more than one-third (1/3) of the members renewed in a given year. The chairman of this committee will be the student affairs coordinator, and he shall report to the Board of Directors when invited by the chairman. This committee shall coordinate all affairs of the Society related to student activities, including distribution of patron funds for support of student attendance at meetings, recognition of student at meetings, reports of students and other student related activities
- 5. Editorial Committee. The chairman of the Board of Directors shall appoint an editorial committee consisting of one (1) associate editor from each of the six (6) sections. The editor will serve as the chairman of the Editorial Committee. This committee shall meet with the editor as called and assist him or her in the editing and preparation of manuscripts for publication in the proceedings as needed. Name of nominees for associate editor position shall be presented to the Board of Directors along with brief resumes of their background and qualifications. Associate editors shall then be appointed by the chairman of the Board of Directors with the approval of the editor. Such appointment shall be for a three (3) year term with an option for renewal.
- 6. Auditing Committee. The President with the approval of the Board of Directors shall appoint a auditing committee which committee shall confer with the treasurer in preparing an audit to be presented by the treasurer at the annual meeting. The President shall appoint such other committees as may be deemed advisable and approved by the Board of Directors.
- 7. Awards Committee. There shall be a separate committee on awards as follows:

A. Presidential Gold Medal Award Committee - the presidential gold medal award committee shall consist of the chairman of the Board of Directors who shall act as chairman and three (3) or more other members of the Society of the corporation appointed by the President.

The Presidential Gold Medal shall be awarded to one (1) individual who has contributed most to Florida horticultural through work published in the proceedings over the proceeding time periods since the given section was last eligible. The award will rotate each year from section to section with the citrus section eligible in 1975 followed in order by the krome memorial, garden and landscape, vegetable, ornamental, handling and processing sections. The awards shall consist of a gold medal suitably inscribed, a printed certificate, an honorarium of \$500.00 and hotel expenses for the recipient and spouse while at the annual meeting.

B. Best Paper Award Committee - the best paper award committees shall be appointed by the President annually from each of the Society's sections. Each committee will consist of three (3) members who:

a. Most recently have served as Vice-Presidents of respective sections but;

b. Who were not authors of papers in that volume of the proceedings from which the selection is being made,

c. Who remain members of the corporation.

If less than three (3) members qualify for appointment in any section, the President may appoint members lacking qualification (a) above. Membership of these committees will not be announced. Each sectional best paper will select the best and most meritorious paper as printed in the previous years proceedings for its respective section. This award shall consist of a medal and printed certificate suitably inscribed and an honorarium of \$200.00.

C. Presidents Industry Award Committee. The selection of the paper qualifying for the presidents industry award will be made by a committee consisting of at least one (1) member from each section of the Society, appointed by the President. The award will be presented to the senior author of a single best paper given at the Florida State Horticultural Society annual meeting by an industry author. An industry author is defined as anyone other than a staff member of an academic institution or a government agency. In those instances where there are both senior and junior author or authors, all must meet the qualifications of industry authors. The senior author of the paper must be a member of the Society. Any paper which receives recognition as the best paper in a section will also be eligible for the President's Industry Award if other qualifications are met. The award shall consist of a plaque suitably inscribed and presented at the Presidents discretion.

D. Council Memorial Tomato Research Award. This award shall be presented based on \$2,500.00 donated to the corporation by Mrs. Emmett H. Council, Council Farms, Ruskin, Florida. The award shall be continued until the fund and earnings from investments are exhausted. The award committee shall consist of the chairman of the Board of Directors and four (4) other members of the corporation appointed at large by the President whose names will not be announced. The award shall be given to the individual or group who have done work with the most potential to further the fresh market tomato industry in Florida through advances reported in any single publication in any scientific or technical form. Such publication must have been published during the two (2) previous calendar years. The senior author of the publication upon which the award is based must be an active member of this corporation. At the discretion of the chairman of the board, the award may not be presented in any given year when there does not appear to be suitable nominees. The award shall consist of a certificate suitably inscribed and a \$200.00 honorarium.

ARTICLE XI BY-LAW AMENDMENT

The By-Laws or the Articles of Incorporation of this Corporation may be amended, repealed or altered in whole or in part by a majority vote at any duly organized meeting of the members at which a quorum shall be present. Notice of the proposed change shall be published in the Newsletter and mailed to each member at his/her last known address at least ten (10) days prior to the time and date of the meeting which is to consider and vote upon such change or amendment. The proposed change or amendment to the By-Law or the Articles of Incorporation shall, prior to notice being given of such meeting, be ratified and approved by the Board of Directors by a majority vote of the Directors present at such Board of Director's meeting. Only those Directors present may cast their vote on the action before the meeting.

Copies of such revised or amended By-Laws or Charter shall be given to any member upon request.

ARTICLE XII PARLIAMENTARY AUTHORITY

The Rules contained in Roberts Rules of Order as Revised shall govern the Board of Directors, Officers, Chairmen of various Committees, and the Members in all cases in which they are applicable, provided, however, that they do not conflict with the By-Laws of the Charter of this Corporation, or with the laws of the State of Florida.

ARTICLE XIII FISCAL YEAR

The fiscal year of the Corporation shall commence on the 1st day of January of each year and terminate on the 31st day of each calendar year.

ARTICLE XIV

SEAL

The Corporation shall have a seal of such design as may be approved by the Board of Directors.

ARTICLE XV DISTRIBUTION OF ASSETS

Upon dissolution, liquidation and winding up of the Corporation, the Board of Directors shall, after paying or making provision for the payment of all of the liabilities of the Corporation, dispose of all assets of the Corporation exclusively for the purposes of the Corporation in such manner, and to such organization or organizations organized and operated exclusively for charitable, education, religious, horticultural or scientific purposes as shall at the time qualify as an exempt organization under Section 501(c)(3) or (c)(5) or the Internal Revenue Code of 1954 as amended, as the Board of Directors may determine. Any assets not so disposed of shall be disposed of by a court of competent jurisdiction in the county in which the principal office of the Corporation is then located, exclusively for such purposes, or to such organization or organizations as such Court shall determine which will not impair the tax exempt status of this Corporation.

ARTICLE XVI INDEMNIFICATION

The Corporation may be empowered to indemnify any officer or director, or any former officer or director, by a majority vote of a quorum of directors or by a majority vote of a quorum of members, who were not parties to such action, suit or proceeding, in the manner provided in Section 607.014 of the Florida Statutes, as amended. If such indemnification is authorized by the directors or members, expenses incurred in defending such civil or criminal action, suit or proceeding may be paid by the Corporation in advance of the final disposition of such action, suit or proceeding in the manner described in Subsection 5 of Section 607.014 of the Florida Statutes, as amended, upon receipt of an undertaking by or on behalf of the director, officer, employee or agent to repay such amount unless he/she is found to be entitled to such indemnification.

ARTICLE XVII

CONTRACTS, CHECKS, DEPOSITS

Section 1. Contracts. The Board of Directors may authorize any officer or agent of the Corporation to enter into any contract or to execute and deliver any instrument or document on behalf of the Corporation, which authority may be general or specific.

Section 2. Deposit. All funds received by the Corporation shall be deposited in such depositaries as selected by the Board of Directors or in such Trusteeship for said funds as the Corporation through its Board of Directors may deem in the best interests of the Corporation. "All uncommitted funds shall be invested by the Treasurer in Federal Insured Investments approved by the Board of Directors." For prudent operation and financial security of the Corporation, funds in an amount at least one and one-half (1.5) times the annual budget shall be maintained whenever possible, in such reserve funds shall not be allowed to exceed two one-half (2.5) times annual budget. Deviations from these practices may be authorized by a majority vote of the Board of Directors.

Section 3. Checks. All checks, drafts, or any authorization for the payment of any notes, sums of money, or other evidence of debt issued in the name of the Corporation shall be signed by such officers or agents as shall from time to time be designated and determined by the Board of Directors. Unless otherwise authorized, such instruments shall be signed by the Treasurer and the President or the Vice-President of the Citrus section.

Section 4. Approval of Bills. All bills before being paid shall be approved by the President, Secretary or Treasurer and vouchers drawn to pay such bills shall be signed as hereinabove provided.

ARTICLE XVIII RESOLUTIONS

Resolutions may originate either in the Resolutions Committee or in a regular scheduled sectional business meeting. In the latter case the resolutions must be supported by a majority vote of those members present voting. All resolutions will be evaluated by the Resolutions Committee and transmitted with its recommendation to the chairman of the Board of Directors. He will place them before the full Board of Directors by either:

A. Calling a special meeting of the Board of Directors or;

B. Instructing the Secretary to poll the members of the Board of

Those resolutions approved by at least eight (8) members of the Board of Directors will be presented by the chairman of the Resolutions Committee to the membership at the annual meeting for action by the Corporation as a whole.

ARTICLE XIX HONORARY MEMBERS

Any individual who has rendered a special meritorious service to the Society and to the advancement of horticultural in Florida may be designated by a two-thirds (2/3) vote of the full Board of Directors as an honorary member of the Corporation. Such honorary member shall not be required to pay dues.

ARTICLE XX RECORDS

The Corporation shall maintain correct and proper books and records and shall keep minutes of all meetings of the members and Board of Directors, at the principal office of the Corporation. All such records may be inspected by any director, member, or agent or attorney of either, or any proper person at any reasonable time.

REPORT OF EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE, 1993

MOTIONS PASSED AND IMPORTANT DISCUSSIONS OF THE FIRST EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE MEETING, LAKE ALFRED, FLORIDA **JANUARY 7, 1993**

The first meeting of the Executive Committee, chaired by Dan Cantliffe, was held in Lake Alfred on January 7, 1993. Membership was reported at 1591. Attendance at the 1992 annual meeting was 532, with 417 preregistered members. Proposal to establish a deadline for payment of dues was discussed. No action was taken pending further discussion. Incorporation of the Florida State Horticultural Society was completed on December 14, 1992. New by-laws were drafted by an attorney. A committee chaired by President Michael Taylor was appointed to study the by-laws and compare them with present by-laws. Motion was passed authorizing construction of a membership display booth with carrying case. Contract for 1994 meeting at the Clarion Hotel, International Drive, Orlando, was signed by Secretary Ismail. Ronnie Reed was authorized by the Chairman to pursue securing tax exempt status for the Society.

Motion by Michael Taylor that a complete, true audit be authorized was passed. Change in nominating procedure was discussed. Suggestion that two persons be nominated for each office was made and discussed. No action was taken. Recommendation by David Hall to present certificates and plaques to patron members was discussed. Action was deferred to next meeting. Gary Wilfret suggested that the door prizes, subsidizing spouses program and status of the Garden and Landscape Section be discussed at the next Executive Committee meeting. Next meeting of the Executive Committee was set for May 4, 1993 at the Citrus Research and Education Center, Lake Alfred

MOTIONS PASSED AND IMPORTANT DISCUSSIONS OF THE SECOND EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE MEETING, LAKE ALFRED, FLORIDA MAY 4, 1993

The Executive Committee held its second meeting of 1993 at 10:00 AM on May 4, 1993 in Lake Alfred. The meeting was chaired by Dan Cantliffe. Paid membership was reported by Mohamed Ismail at 1348. David Buchanan, Treasurer, reported cash on hand of \$31,037.94. A motion by Michael Taylor, President, to transfer Society Certificate of Deposit from Winter Haven Mortgage Corporation to a Federally insured institution was seconded and passed.

Mariann Holland, Editor of the Citrus Industry Magazine presented a proposal to publish the annual meeting program at no cost to the Society. Gary Wilfret was appointed chairman of a committee to study the Citrus Industry Magazine offer with Sal Locascio and Norman Childers,

New by-laws were discussed and corrected. A motion to approve them was advanced by Michael Taylor, and it was passed. They will be published for examination by the membership.

Certificates of recognition of Patron Members were circulated. One of several was proposed by David Buchanan and was approved. A motion by Ray Volin to set the registration fees for the 1993 meeting was seconded and passed. They are as follows: Prior to Oct. 1: Member \$50.00, Spouse \$30.00, Student \$15.00. After Oct. 1: Member \$55.00, Spouse \$35.00, Student \$20.00.

A motion to hire Sorrell Software & Support to provide clerical services to the Society from May 1 to December 31, 1993 for a fee of \$801.67 per month, plus mileage and office supplies, was made by Mohamed Ismail. It was seconded and passed.

Mohamed Ismail moved that the Society invite Wanda Ryan and her husband, Jack, to attend the next annual meeting of the Society at the Society's expense and that a resolution be prepared and presented to Mrs. Ryan in recognition for her service to the Society.

Section workshop proposals were made by Vice Presidents, and each was budgeted at \$500.00.

The possibility of merging the Garden and Landscape and Ornamental Sections was discussed. Kathleen Ruppert reported that for the period between 1988 and 1992, 101 papers were in the Ornamental Section and 102 were presented in the Garden and Landscape Section. Last year, 12 papers were presented in the Garden and Landscape Section and 18 were presented in the Ornamental Section. Discussion was tabled until the next meeting, which was scheduled for 9:00 AM, September 1, 1993 at the Doral Hotel in Miami Beach. The meeting was adjourned at 2:45 PM.

MOTIONS PASSED AND IMPORTANT DISCUSSIONS OF THE THIRD EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE MEETING, MIAMI BEACH, FLORIDA SEPTEMBER 1, 1993

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COMMENTS ON DEVELOPMENT OF THE ENDOWMENT FUND Of The Florida State Horticultural Society

I have an old-time friend, Dr. Carl Bittner, retired Fruit Extension Specialist at Pennsylvania State University, University Park, who started an Endowment Fund over 15 years ago as a member of their very active State Horticultural Association of Pennsylvania. (Carl and I served on the American Society for Horticultural Science Endowment Fund Committee for a few years and helped build it to its present status.) Back in 1988 when our Society Committee was trying to initiate our own Fund at the FSHS Board Meetings, I asked Carl Bittner for some details on how they got their Fund started and operating. Parts of his reply are given below which may be of interest in further development of our Fund.

"Dear Norm:

"Our Endowment Fund Committee did not develop By-laws for our Constitution as you did (see our FSHS Society By-laws in Vol. 104, pp 289-290. 1991). However, we did develop a brochure. The whole idea probably originated with me. I am a bit hep on endowments. Some years ago I spoke to Dr. Al Krezdorn when he was President (1978) of the American Society for Horticultural Science, to try to get one started with that Society which since has happened and they have well over \$100,000.

"Here is one of my main reasons for promoting the Fund in Pennsylvania. I wanted the scientist who was willing to work on long-term projects to have assured funding over a period of years. All too many researchers today are so anxious to get their names on publications so they will look good on resume's and hasten their promotions, so they work only on short-term projects. Also, much of the money is being allocated over only two- to three-year periods. How can you work on a long-term project like "Winter injury on peaches" unless funding is assured?

"Well, anyway, long-term projects was my aim and so I suggested committee members have long tenure so some over-anxious do-gooder couldn't sway the committee too much in any one year. The stability of the Committee would prevent this. I thought it advisable to have an odd number (nine) of committee members as further protection against rash moves.

"Our progress has been a bit slow as expected. After a few years of the Fund's existence, we have only reached a bit over \$60,000; our goal is \$100,000 before we start allocating funds from interest earned. We already are earning over \$4,000 interest yearly. I started the Fund by donating \$2,000 and a friend of mine also contributed \$2,000. All of our Committee members except one have donated \$1,000. Donations from bequests are usually generous, but someone has to die to get the larger donations. We are getting there (1988), but more slowly than I like (by 1993 they are above \$100,000)."

It took a little under 15 years for the Pennsylvania Committee to reach their goal of \$100,000 before using the interest. Let's hope we also can have that success. Our Fund now is approaching \$5,000. I shall be leaving the Endowment Fund Committee of FSHS this year (1994), which is the last of the original Committee of William Krome, Carl Campbell, and N. F. Childers. The new Committee of five for 1995 is: Norman Todd, Harvey Snively, Jr., Ed Holcomb, and Ted Winsberg with Charles Conover, Chairman, each serving a 5-year term, a new member appointed each year as one member leaves.










