### SUCCESS ROOTING AVOCADO CUTTINGS

*Abstract.* There is a need for Avocado rootstocks resistant to Phytophthora cinammomi and other related soil problems. This was discussed in a paper by A. H. Krezdorn, D. Marte, and R. J. Marte, IFAS, University of Florida. Not only is there a demand for rootstocks resistant to Phytophthora cinammomi,

but also for rootstocks that produce cold-hardy cultivars. Considerable progress in the rooting of stem cuttings of cultivars that root slowly has been achieved; also cuttings from juvenile material of cultivars that rarely rooted have now been rooted by judicious combinations of bottom heat and growth regulators. Findings point towards experimentation as to whether or not a good cultivar can be grown and used as a stock for cuttings, through which time alone can determine.

### WIND SCAR CONTROL BY WIND SPEED REDUCTION THROUGH THE USE OF BARRIERS

*Abstract.* Wind scar blemish is a severe problem of the citrus industry internationally. Increased study of wind breaks and wind scar damage has resulted in suggested methods of reducing damage. The reduction of wind scar damage is of great importance to the grower of fresh fruit varieties. Experimental evidence indicates both fruit sizes and fruit yields can be improved by controlling wind speeds within a planting.

Studies in Florida and Australia have shown that dramatic results can be obtained by using both artificial and natural wind breaks to control wind speeds and the resulting scarring. Suggested solutions to the problem emerged when researchers determined the velocity at which wind did its damage and at what stage of development the young fruit was susceptible to damage.

Whether wind speeds were reduced by natural barriers of hedged trees, or by the use of artificial barriers, results seem to indicate that economic benefit would justify a program of wind speed control and reduction for crops intended for the fresh fruit market.

### PEST MANAGEMENT STRATEGIES

*Abstract.* Over the past 4 years, Dr. C. W. McCoy has been conducting an experiment based on strategical pest controls of Valencia oranges. His paper on this was both interesting and educational. Three types of strategic controls were attempted on 3 'Valencia' blocks located in the Ridge area. The 3 controls were: (1) no control; (2) sulfur, and (3) integrated, which consisted of biological, cultural and chemical methods in combination.

Insect populations measured were rust mite, scales and

minor pests wherever populations were high enough to be monitored. *Hirsutella* populations were also monitored. In the no control block, yields were as good as those under traditional control although external quality was poor and greasy spot was severe. Sulfur used alone was harmful to the natural predators. In the integrated control plot, no control of rust mite was necessary for two years, also *Hirsutella* was higher than in the traditional plot. No control was required for spider mites, scale insects, whitefly and mealy bugs during the entire four years.

Their findings substantiate those of Whiteside. A reduced spray program is acceptable and economical for concentrate plant production where high external quality is of little value.

### NEW INSIGHTS IN LANDSCAPE ARCHITECTURE

*Abstract.* As a Brazilian student, it was an honor to be invited to attend the Society's Annual Meeting. It was an unique experience for one looking forward to a career in landscape architecture.

## THE CONTROL OF LANTANA

*Abstract.* Lantana which has been introduced all over the world as an ornamental is now becoming a serious pest in Florida citrus groves, especially the Indian River area. The two controls being researched are biological and herbicidal. Work in Hawaii and Australia shows that a number of host-specific insects are available for use in the biological control.

However, efforts to introduce some of these insects are opposed by nurserymen who consider it a valuable plant.

Lantana is tolerant to presently registered herbicides which eliminate competitive weeds. In field trials, excellent control of lantana was obtained with Roundup and Bay Met. Less control was achieved with other herbicides such as Silvex, R-2491, DPX-1108 (Krenite), and Sumitol. The researchers indicated that hopefully in the future an integrated control will be available which will include an effective herbicide working along with an acceptable biological control.

## CITRUS ROOTSTOCK INFORMATION

*Abstract.* New and accurate information concerning available citrus rootstocks is always welcomed. Dr. W. S. Castle pointed out that a grower requiring Milam rootstock as a burrowing nematode barrier can also expect a good performance in many other horticultural areas. Dr. G. Yelenosky reported on a test of the cold hardiness of young 'Valencia'

trees budded on various rootstocks, exposed to hardening-off conditions and then subjected to freezing conditions. The trees budded to Swingle citrumelo fared the best. There was some overlap with Rusk and sour orange, with the 3 comparing favorably. Rough lemon, as expected, appeared at the bottom of the list.

Dr. Yelenosky pointed out that cold hardening does not always take place in nature, however when citrus trees are hardened-off, their cold tolerance is greatly improved.

## TISSUE CULTURE OF ORNAMENTALS

*Abstract.* Many informative papers were presented but of most interest to me were the 3 on tissue culture. Two were by Dr. J. F. Knauss of IFAS Agricultural Research Center, Apopka and one was by R. E. Strode of Oglesby Nursery, Ft. Lauderdale, Florida. The talk by Randy Strode concerned the production of daylilies through tissue culture methods. I found that his procedures for commercial tissue culturing

were much the same as the ones we use at Oakdell. The talk by Jim Knauss on producing ferns with partial tissue culture methods was a really exciting idea and I have been to the Research Center since the meeting to see some of the ferns which have been produced using this method. The paper on Dieffenbachia was the most valuable to me because of the concern with the bacterium Erwinia which infects massive numbers of dieffenbachia at Oakdell. Erwinia can be eliminated from Dieffenbachia by growing through tissue culture and then indexing for pathogens by using different specific media.

## Constitution

Article I—NAME—This organization shall be known as the Florida State Horticultural Society.

Article II—OBJECTIVE—The objective of this Society shall be the advancement and development of horticulture in Florida.

Article III—YEAR—The years shall begin January 1 and close December 31.

Article IV—CLASSIFICATION OF MEMBERSHIP—There shall be four classifications of membership, all of which carry voting privileges:

- A—Annual
- B—Sustaining
- C—Patron
- D—Student

Nothing in this article shall be construed as operating against or cancelling the privileges of Life Members accepted as Life Members prior to the adoption of this constitution.

Article V—ELIGIBILITY FOR MEMBERSHIP—Any individual, firm or partnership interested in the development and advancement of horticulture in Florida shall be eligible for membership.

Article VI—DUES—Dues shall be paid annually according to classification at rate as prescribed in By-laws.

Article VII—ANNUAL MEETING—The Society shall hold an annual meeting each year in accordance with the By-laws unless prevented from doing so by causes beyond its control.

Article VIII—SECTIONS—The Society shall be divided into sections representing various horticultural interests as provided in the By-laws.

Article IX—OFFICERS—The officers shall consist of a President, a Vice-President from each section, a Secretary, a Publication Secretary, an Editing Secretary, a Program Coordinator, and a Treasurer, which officers shall be elected by a majority vote of the membership present at the annual meeting and shall assume their respective offices at the beginning of the new year.

Article X—SUCCESSION—In the absence of the President or his inability to serve temporarily the Vice President of the Citrus Section shall serve instead. If the position of President is vacated, the Executive Committee shall designate his successor.

Article XI—EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE—The Executive Committee shall consist of not more than 15 persons including the immediate Past President and all Officers above named, the others to be selected at same time and in same manner as prescribed in Article IX. The immediate Past President shall be chairman of the Executive Committee. The Executive Committee shall have authority to act for the Society between annual meetings.

## By-Laws

1. The Society's year shall begin January 1 and end December 31.
2. Dues—dues shall be paid annually for the current year and shall be payable to the Treasurer of the Society. Dues shall be as follows:

Annual Membership	\$ 10.00
Sustaining Membership	\$ 15.00
Patron Membership	\$100.00
Annual membership (student)	\$ 5.00

3. Annual Meetings—the Society shall hold an annual meeting in the fall of each year at a place and time selected by a majority vote of the Executive Committee. The order of business at the annual meeting shall be determined in advance each year by the Executive Committee.

4. The meetings of the Society shall be devoted only to horticultural topics, from scientific and practical standpoints, and the presiding officer shall rule out of order all motions, resolutions and discussions tending to commit the Society to partisan politics or mercantile ventures.

5. SECTIONS—The Society shall consist of the following sections:

- Citrus Section
- Vegetable Section
- Krome Memorial Institute  
(Tropical and Deciduous Fruits)
- Ornamental and Floriculture Section
- Handling and Processing Section
- Garden and Landscape Section

Other sections may be added on recommendation of a majority of the Executive Committee when approved by a majority vote of the membership present at an annual meeting.

### COMMITTEES

*Nominating and Membership Committee*—The President shall appoint a joint Nominating and Membership Committee consisting of not less than 2 persons from each section, one of whom shall be the most recent Past Sectional Vice-President able to serve. This Committee shall develop plans for soliciting and promoting new memberships throughout the year and shall make nominations at the Annual Meeting of the Officers and other members of the Executive Committee for the ensuing year provided that the members representing various Sections shall seek advice of each Section in open meetings concerning the nomination of Vice-President for that Section. Such nominations by the Committee, however, shall not preclude nominations from the floor. The President shall appoint a member of this joint Committee as Chairman.

*Program Committee*—The Vice Presidents of the various sections shall constitute a program committee of which the President shall be the Chairman, the Program Coordinator, the Vice Chairman, and the Secretary and Treasurer shall be ex officio members.

*Auditing Committee*—The President with the approval of the Executive Committee shall appoint an auditing committee which committee shall confer with the Treasurer in preparing an audit to be presented by the Treasurer at the annual meeting. The President shall appoint such other committees as may be deemed advisable and approved by the Executive Committee.

*Awards Committees*—There shall be separate committees on awards, as follows:

(1) *Presidential Gold Medal Award Committee*.—The Presidential Gold Medal Award Committee shall consist of the Chairman of the Executive Committee, who shall act as Chairman, and three or more other members of the Society appointed by the President.

The Presidential Gold Medal shall be awarded to one individual who has contributed most to Florida horticulture through work published in the *Proceedings* over the preceding time period since the given section was last eligible. The award will rotate each year from section to section with the Citrus Section eligible in 1975 followed in order by the Krome Memorial, Garden and Landscape, Vegetable, Ornamental, Handling and Processing Sections.

The award will consist of a gold medal suitably inscribed, a printed certificate, an honorarium of \$250.00, and hotel expenses for the recipient and spouse while at the annual meeting.

(2) *Best Paper Award Committees*.—The Best Paper Award Committees shall be appointed by the President annually from each of the Society's sections. Each Committee will consist of three members who a) most recently have served as vice-president of the respective sections, but b) who were not authors of papers in that volume of the *Proceedings* from which the selection is being made, and c) who remain members of the Society. If less than three members qualify for appointment in any section, the President may appoint members lacking qualification "a" above. Membership of these committees will not be announced.

Each sectional Best Paper Committee will select the best and most meritorious paper as printed in the previous year's *Proceedings* for its respective section.

This award shall consist of a medal and printed certificate suitably inscribed, and an honorarium of \$100.00.

(3) *President's Industry Award Committee*.—The selection of the paper qualifying for the President's Industry Award will be made by a committee consisting of at least one member from each section of the society, appointed by the President. The award will be presented to the author of the single best paper given at the Florida State Horticultural Society's annual meeting by an industry author. An industry author is defined as anyone other than a staff member of an academic institution or a government agency. In those instances where there are both senior and junior author or authors, all must meet the qualifications of industry authors. The senior author of the paper must be a member of the Society. Any paper which receives recognition as the best paper in a Section will also be eligible for the President's Industry Award if other qualifications are met. The award shall consist of a plaque suitably inscribed and presented at the President's discretion.

(4) *Council Memorial Tomato Research Award*.—This award shall be presented based upon \$2,500, donated to the Society by Mrs. Emmett H. Council, Council Farms, Ruskin, Florida. The award shall be continued until the fund and earnings from investments are exhausted. The Award Committee shall consist of the Chairman of the Executive Committee, and four other members of the Society appointed at large by the President whose names will not be announced. The award shall be given to the individual or group who have done work with the most potential to further the fresh market tomato industry in Florida through advances reported in any single publication in any scientific or technical form. Such publication must have been published during the two previous calendar years. The senior author of the publication

upon which the award is based must be an active member of FSHS. At the discretion of the Chairman, the award may not be presented in any given year when there do not appear to be suitable nominees.

The award shall consist of a certificate suitably inscribed and \$200.00 honorarium.

#### DEPOSITORY

The Executive Committee shall have authority to select a depository or establish a trusteeship for funds of the Society as it may deem in the best interest of the Society. All Patron Membership dues and all donations, unless otherwise specified by donor, shall be invested by the Treasurer in United States Government bonds. The earnings from these bonds shall be left as accrued values or reinvested in the United States Government bonds unless it is ordered by the Executive Committee of the Society that such earnings can be made available for operating expense.

#### APPROVAL OF BILLS

All bills before being paid shall be approved by the President, Secretary or Treasurer, and vouchers drawn to pay such bills shall be signed by the President or in his absence the Vice President of the Citrus Section and countersigned by the Treasurer.

#### RESOLUTIONS

Resolutions may originate either in the Resolutions Committee or in a regularly scheduled sectional business meeting. In the latter case, the resolutions must be supported by a majority vote of those members present and voting. All resolutions will be evaluated by the Resolutions Committee and transmitted with its recommendation to the Chairman of the Executive Committee. He will place them before the full Executive Committee by either (a) calling a special meeting of the Executive Committee or (b) instructing the Secretary to poll the members of the Executive Committee. Those resolutions approved by at least eight members of the Executive Committee will be presented by the Chairman of the Resolutions Committee to the membership at the annual business meeting for action by the Society as a whole.

#### HONORARY MEMBERS

Any individual who has rendered especially meritorious service to the Society and to the advancement of horticulture in Florida may be designated by a two-thirds vote of the full Executive Committee of the Society as an Honorary Member of the Society. Such honorary members shall not be required to pay dues.

#### AMENDMENTS

These By-laws may be amended at any annual meeting by an affirmative majority vote of the membership present when such amendments have been approved and recommended by a majority of the Executive Committee.

These By-laws shall take effect immediately upon adoption by the membership at the annual meeting in October, 1951.

These By-laws were revised at the Annual Meetings in November, 1963, November, 1964, November, 1967, November, 1971, November, 1973, November, 1974, and November 1975.

## REPORT OF THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE 1976

Four meetings of the Executive Committee were held during 1976. Motions that were carried and important discussions at the first Executive Committee meeting, January 6, 1976, AREC, Lake Alfred.

Thirteen members of the Executive Committee were present with Chairman Leon Miller presiding. In general discussion it was agreed that the 1975 Annual Meeting at the Dutch Inn, Lake Buena Vista, was successful with about 1,150 registered in attendance. Many compliments were received on the meeting and the only difficulties encountered were regarding light controls, acoustics, and sound transfer between meeting rooms. Reed reported the Site Selection Committee had received proposals from four different hotels for the 1977 meeting. Based on room price quotations, general accommodations, desirability of a central Florida location, and assurances by the Dutch Inn that they would improve the lighting and acoustical arrangements, the Site Selection Committee recommended the Dutch Inn for 1977. A contract with the Dutch Inn was authorized.

The Secretary reported on membership distribution at annual meetings. Over the past two years, the composition of attendees at the annual meetings have been approximately: growers, 10%; management, 13%; sales, 17%; research, 37%, and education, 23%. Discussion was held regarding the question of registration at meetings. The By-laws require that all authors of papers be members of the Society and those presenting papers be registered at the meeting. This requirement had not been heeded at all times, and the Executive Committee was urged to encourage registration wherever possible.

Discussions were held regarding status of the Proceedings and possible increases in registration fee for non-members. It was decided there probably would not be sufficient advantage to the Society in increasing non-member registration fees at present. A discussion was held regarding the student support program. Previous committee members and the chairman of the Student Support Committee were complimented on the fine results. Committee members were urged to continue soliciting patron members for student support and the Executive Committee was urged to continue supporting the program.

A discussion was held on costs of back issues of Proceedings. Because of increases in mailing cost, current printing cost, and general scarcity of older copies of the Proceedings, the general price of Proceedings was increased to \$10 and a motion to price Proceedings at the same price as current issues passed unanimously. A motion passed to increase the Society clerk's salary by 7.5% for a merit increase and to pay an appropriate bonus for additional work beyond half-time required to prepare and have a 10-year index printed. A discussion was held and several suggestions were considered for observing the Bicentennial Anniversary of the U.S. during 1976-1977.

Motions that were carried and important discussions at the second meeting of the Executive Committee, May 4, 1976, AREC, Lake Alfred.

Fifteen members were present with Chairman Leon Miller presiding. Mr. Joe Race, President of the Florida Nurserymen's Association presented a request from the Association regarding the Texas Star Ruby grapefruit, its importation without authorization, and requested a Resolution and support from the Florida State Horticultural Society on the position of the Nurserymen's Association with respect to this question. Following a long discussion and presentation, a motion passed to send a letter to the association supporting the State quarantine laws and the State and DPI position in the Star Ruby grapefruit case. The motion also included a Resolution to this effect to be recommended to the general membership at the annual meeting in November, 1976, and forwarded to the Florida Nurserymen's Association. A second motion passed to pledge monetary support up to \$1,000 for assisting the Florida Nurserymen's Association and other groups in obtaining attorneys, paying court fees and other costs as needed in pursuing this case.

Editing Secretary Grierson reported the Proceedings had been completed, printed and distributed at an earlier date than they ever had before. He also indicated a Memorium page was included for Mr. Lacy Tate, long-time member of the Executive Committee and the Society. A discussion was held concerning the possibility of changing to 8½" x 11" page size for future volumes and changing to typeset instead of photographed tables, charts and figures. There have been previous suggestions that the Proceedings be changed for the 1976 Bicentennial copy and the Executive Committee approved changing the page size and typeset figures and tables as part of that change. Grierson reported work had begun on the 10-year Index and it was scheduled to be completed and available for distribution at the Annual Meeting in November. A discussion was held regarding student sponsorship and patron memberships. Several recommendations and suggestions have been made by the student sponsorship committee and these were given consideration. Sectional vice-presidents were encouraged to give more recognition to students attending their sessions. The allocation of funds to different educational institutions was discussed.

The Executive Committee agreed it was advisable to maintain one additional complete set of Proceedings at a location other than AREC, Lake Alfred, where the basic set is maintained. A set had been started at AREC, Bradenton, and it was the consensus this set should be continued and missing volumes should be sent to complete that set and bring it up-to-date. A discussion was held regarding the possibility of a Symposium on EPA regulations held in conjunction with the Citrus Section. The Vice-President of the section, Mr. Edwards, was authorized to plan such a Symposium if it could be worked into the time allotment for the section. A discussion was held regarding the Annual Meeting in November, printing of programs, and the subjects to be presented at the General Session. These would include "A Bicentennial of Horticulture for the Nation," and "A Bicentennial of Horticulture for the State". Discussion was held concerning possible ways in which attendance at the Bicentennial meeting might be encouraged. Executive Committee members were encouraged to promote attendance as much as possible, wherever they could exert influence. Conover presented instructions to Vice-Presidents regarding their responsibilities, deadlines, papers, abstracts, drafts of the program, authors agreements and how to handle expenses. Reed reported on local arrangements. He indicated entertainment possibilities for the Annual Banquet would need to be developed shortly.

Reed discussed the need for an Addressograph for the Society clerk. It was pointed out due to increased membership, approaching 2,000 members, when considering delinquent members who often need to be contacted about dues renewals, the old handmade plates and handranked machine was inadequate. Additional mailings also increased the effort required for keeping up with membership. A motion passed to authorize purchase of a modern Addressograph machine for use of the clerk in carrying out and preparing the Society's mailings.

After discussion, a motion passed to establish registration fees at the 1976 Annual meeting the same as those for the previous year: \$10 for regular members, \$5 for students and \$3 for spouses.

Motions passed and important discussions at the third Executive Committee Meeting, Carillon Hotel, Miami Beach, October 8, 1976.

Fourteen members were present with Chairman Leon Miller presiding. A membership report was given by the Secretary indicating there were about 1800 members which included 585 members whose dues had lapsed but who had not been dropped from the rolls yet. A discussion was held regarding membership drives being carried on by individual sections. Reed reported for the Site Selection committee. A signed contract is firm for the Dutch Inn for 1977 and a contract proposal had been received for the 1978 Annual Meeting at the

Carillon. A motion passed requiring Vice-Presidents to poll their respective sessions during the 1976 meeting regarding the question of alternating between a south Florida and a central Florida location in alternate years. The Executive Committee withheld action on the site for the 1978 annual meeting, pending results of this poll.

President Sites reported the Resolution regarding the Star Ruby grapefruit budwood problem was being drawn up and would be presented at the Annual Meeting. Colburn reported on patron memberships and student sponsorships. He indicated support for the student program had been well received and further support was expected. A motion was made to allocate student support funds to the University of Florida, Florida Southern College, Valencia Junior College and Polk Community College. The Secretary was instructed to request the names of students being supported on these funds from the respective institutions. A general discussion was held regarding use of support money for other purposes such as purchasing a mini-bus for student's field trips or certain types of equipment. The Executive Committee was not in favor of financial assistance for these purposes and it was the consensus these funds should be used primarily for student attendance at meetings.

Ralph Thompson reported on the status of the printing contract bids. A motion passed to change the page size to 8½" x 11", change to type-set tables and award the printing contract to E. O. Painter Co., the lowest bidder, for the 1976 Proceedings. A motion passed to add a \$5 service charge to all foreign memberships to cover additional cost of postage and handling. The secretary was instructed to send a letter to foreign members explaining the service charge and requesting additional postage be sent if they requested their Proceedings by Air Mail.

Conover discussed program coordination and activities and distributed copies of the preliminary program. Vice-presidents were instructed regarding receipt of manuscripts and handling of abstracts and papers.

Robert Conover discussed local arrangements for the 1976 meeting. These would include a ladies' luncheon, orchid seedlings to be presented at the luncheon, a display of tropical fruit and vegetables, and a ten-piece orchestra and entertainment by Fantasio the magician at the Annual Banquet.

Discussion were held regarding nominations for officers. The Executive Committee voted to instruct the nominating committee to bring forth a slate of nominees, naming one nominee only for each office. It was pointed out nominations would be open during the Annual Business meeting. Some discussion was held regarding the requirement of registration to hear individual papers, attempts to popularize the Proceedings, and conversion of all Proceedings manuscripts to metric units. A motion passed to appoint a committee to study conversion of all Proceedings data to the metric system, and make a recommendation to the Executive Committee during 1977. The Secretary indicated award recipients for best papers, and other general society awards had been selected and would be notified shortly. A motion passed authorizing the President to appoint a representative of the Florida State Horticultural Society to attend the Florida Southern College Inauguration.

Motions passed and important discussion of the fourth Executive Committee Meeting, Carillon Hotel, Miami Beach, November 2, 1976.

A discussion was held regarding appointments and composition of the nominating committee, nominees and election procedures.

Details of the 1976 meeting were reviewed, final plans were completed.

## MINUTES 89th ANNUAL BUSINESS MEETING November 4, 1976 Miami Beach, Florida

The meeting was called to order by President John Sites at 4:00 p.m. The Secretary moved adoption of the minutes of the 88th Annual Meeting as published in the Society Proceedings, Volume 88, page 622. The motion was seconded and carried.

The Secretary read the report of the Executive Committee for 1976 and moved its adoption. The motion was seconded and carried. The report is published elsewhere in these Proceedings.

Treasurer Reed presented his report and moved its adoption. The motion was carried. The Treasurer's Report as brought up-to-date through December 31, 1976, is printed elsewhere in these Proceedings.

The Membership Report was presented by the Secretary who moved its approval. The motion was seconded and carried and the report as updated through December 31, 1976, is printed elsewhere in these Proceedings.

President Sites presented Mr. W. G. Edwards, Vice-President, Citrus Section, to present a resolution which had been cleared and recommended by the Resolutions Committee and the Executive Committee as follows:

WHEREAS, THE unauthorized importation of Star Ruby grapefruit from Texas has resulted in the propagation and dissemination of over 60,000 grove and nursery trees in Florida, and,

WHEREAS, importations of this nature violate the fundamental principles of good horticultural practices and plant protection procedures, and,

WHEREAS, one of these trees has now been found to be infected with necrotic ring spot, a virus not previously known to occur in Florida, and,

WHEREAS, the Division of Plant Industry in cooperation with Texas A&I University and the United States Department of Agriculture, Orlando, has a supply of this budwood selected from a single clonal source and indexed for virus diseases, and,

WHEREAS, the Division of Plant Industry cannot release this material because of the likelihood of it being intermixed with and contaminated by the previous unauthorized importation,

NOW, THEREFORE, the Florida State Horticultural Society urges the Commissioner of Agriculture, and the Division of Plant Industry, to seek every possible means to cause the immediate destruction of all the trees derived from the original unauthorized importation as a cause of grave danger to the Florida Citrus Industry, and

FURTHER, HEREBY authorizes the Society to contribute a sum not to exceed \$1,000 to secure specialized legal or related services to accomplish this end, as required. Mr. Edwards moved adoption of this resolution. The motion was seconded and following a brief discussion the motion passed with a large majority in favor.

Editing Secretary Grierson gave his report. He mentioned both changes in page sizes and type-set tables which would be incorporated into the 1976 Volume 89 of the Proceedings.
