VALUE OF STUDENT PARTICIPATION IN THE FLORIDA STATE HORTICULTURAL SOCIETY MEETING

Abstract. The Florida State Horticultural Society includes members from all phases of Florida's horticultural industries. Its meetings bring all of these people together to discuss the problems facing the industry from research, commercial and personal aspects.

One of the greatest advantages for a student

attending this meeting is the personal discussions they may have with people involved in the industry. While attending school, it is hard for most students to meet people in horticultural industries. These meetings allow a student to hear what is happening in horticulture, the problems and some of the hopes for the future. An early grasp of these problems, should aid ones future endeavors. This is also a good opportunity for students to meet people who might be interested in employing a college graduate.

YOUNG TREE DECLINE

Abstract. A key topic of the Citrus Section was "young tree decline" (YTD). Various authors discussed different aspects of research including examination by electron microscope. YTD is a commercially important disease for which no definite cause has yet been discovered. It has been found to be related to water stress, zinc accumulation,

and, more specifically, to a plugging of the xylem vessels. Attempted control measures included a series of experiments including use of soil and foliar sprays, while another paper discussed the possible use of 'Swingle' citrumelo instead of the rough lemon rootstock. As a sponsored student, I felt that the concern of researchers and growers in attacking this serious current problem exemplifies how the commercial citrus industry benefits by the existence of the Florida State Horticultural Society.

IMPRESSIONS OF MECHANICAL HARVESTING OF CITRUS

Abstract. With the anticipated shortage of labor in Florida and the progressive trend toward automation of industry of the United States, the future of mechanical harvesting and the associ-

ated equipment is excellent. The various speakers emphasized the definite need for mechanical harvesting to supplement the labor force and to cope with the rapid increase in the volume of citrus. The continued success of the citrus industry of Florida will be dependent on economical, dependable, and efficient mechanization of fruit harvesting. In Florida there has been a considerable amount of successful research in this area, both

public and private. Although some of the equipment is still in the developmental stages, results are very encouraging. The limb shaker, chemical abscission, and the wind machine appear to be the predominant factors in various combinations. Although research has shown that the limb shaker has an effect on subsequent yields, this is however, minimal on sweet oranges regardless of whether the root system is deep or shallow. Chemical abscission has reached an economic position. The

approved abscission compound is reported to have no adverse effects on bloom, young fruit, or foliage of early and midseason oranges and reaction time is minimal. Trash removal devices and pick-up systems have also become very efficient. The gap between experimentation and implementation of this equipment will greatly depend on the evolution of the equipment to the point of grower acceptance.

CITRUS PRODUCTION IN THE TROPICAL AMERICAS

Abstract. Dr. A. H. Krezdorn highlighted many factors contributing to citrus production in the Tropical Americas. The climate, soil conditions, and terrain are not ideal in many areas. Further development of the elevated valleys between snow-capped mountains, improved drainage tech-

niques in the rain forests, and research into the disease and pest controls need to be accomplished before citrus may be commercially produced on a large scale.

Current information on rootstocks, biological and chemical pest controls, and water management practices from other citrus producing areas can be utilized by the respective areas of the Tropical Americas. Within several years, the Tropical Americas could become a leader in citrus production.

REACTIONS TO THE 87th FSHS MEETINGS

Abstract. As a sponsored student to the Krome Memorial Institute, I was most interested in a series of four papers dealing with agriculture and research in Dade County. These papers presented an overall view of some factors influencing agriculture in a horticulturally unique area. Papers, by S. Goldweber, J. F. McGuire, D. O. Wolfenbarger, and R. J. Knight, covered topics which

will be of value to me in future work in the county. The economic, political, climatological and environmental ramifications of agriculture in Dade County were covered in some detail. It is encouraging to have so diverse a group of people, rooted in horticulture, come together for a common goal. These people are striving, by sharing information and ideas, to increase the effectiveness of technology and science in horticulture. The papers answered some of my questions and gave me ideas that will benefit my future in agribusiness.

CONTROL OF CITRUS FRUIT DECAY WITH BENLATE

Abstract. Attending the Handling & Processing Section enabled me to gain first hand information on application of the principles learned in the

classroom. A report on decay control by A. A. McCornack was particularly interesting. Almost complete control of stem-end rot and green mold of oranges and grapefruit has been achieved with Benlate (benomyl). Approved for use by the Environmental Protection Agency, it has a residue tolerance level of 10 parts per million (ppm) in or on citrus fruits. Benlate is effective for control

when it is: (1) applied as an aqueous suspension prior to waxing; (2) incorporated in a water wax; and (3) incorporated in solvent wax. The latter method is slightly less effective.

Decay control of tangerines, tangelos, and 'Temple's' using Benlate, while less effective than for other citrus fruits, was better than with most

other postharvest fungicides. Acceptable decay control was obtained with commercial preharvest sprays of benomyl three weeks prior to harvesting. Residues found in or on the fruit ranged from 0.1 to 1.0 ppm, much below the permitted tolerance level.

FUTURE TRENDS FROM THE GARDEN & LANDSCAPE SECTION

Abstract. As a woman horticulturist I was particularly interested in the Garden and Landscape section. The papers discussed below were particularly timely. "Beneficial Horticultural Uses of Man's Wastes" by C. R. Johnson and D. B. McConnel pointed out possible uses for the billions of gallons of sewage effluent discharged daily by the ever-growing human population. More research is needed in this area, but it must be undertaken with discretion. Every citizen, especially the taxpayers, should be informed of such

research programs, and should have an opportunity to find out if the sewage effluent proposals are in the best interest of the people and the environment. Another timely paper in this section was "Growing . . . Growing . . . Grown" by G. Shannon Smith presented with enthusiasm and concern such items as ordinances protecting plants, and the lack of education in the plant sciences in the schools. Mr. Smith believes that by educating the children in our society they will, by the time they are adults, have a better appreciation of man's environment, and will work to protect and preserve it. Programs such as this should have been started long ago, but it is not too late if something is done about it in the near future.

**REPORT OF THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE
FLORIDA STATE HORTICULTURAL SOCIETY—1974**

Four meetings of the Executive Committee were held during 1974.

Motions that were carried and important discussions at the First Executive Committee meeting, January 3, 1974, AREC, Lake Alfred.

Fifteen members of the Executive Committee were present with Chairman Burt Colburn presiding. In general discussion the question arose whether an author who has not submitted his paper at time of the meeting should still be allowed to make his presentation. A discussion followed with the general opinion that a strong position toward following instructions to authors should be taken by Vice-Presidents. Difficult cases should be referred to the Editorial Committee before final action.

A report was received from the Site Selection Committee. The Committee recommended the FSHS return to the Carillon Hotel for the 1976 meeting and that negotiation proceed with the Carillon for this meeting. The Committee deferred action until the May meeting of the Executive Committee.

The proposed Tomato Research Award was reviewed and a committee chairman was appointed. This Committee was to develop details of the Award and report back to the Executive Committee at a future meeting.

After discussion of the need to use experienced people on both the membership and nominating committee, it was moved and seconded that the Membership Committee and Nominating Committee be composed of the previous year's Sectional Vice-Presidents plus a designee of the President from each section and that the president designate the chairman of each of these committees and that the By-laws be changed to reflect same.

There was some discussion of the need for establishing an additional award to recognize service to the horticultural industry by those working outside the Society's regular activities. The Chairman appointed an Ad Hoc Committee to study this question and report back.

A motion carried to increase the salary of the FSHS clerk by 14% which included a 5% merit increase plus a 9% cost of living adjustment.

These are motions that were carried and important discussions at the second meeting of the Executive Committee, May 9, 1974, AREC, Lake Alfred.

Thirteen members were present with Chairman Burt Colburn presiding. A discussion was held concerning life memberships of libraries and organizations. It was generally felt because they were irrevocable such life memberships to organizations should be discontinued and by unanimous vote the Secretary was directed to correspond with these organizations asking them to relinquish life memberships and maintain regular memberships.

In discussion it was pointed out that it would be easier to compile the membership listings in the Proceedings if only one list were used and sustaining members were differentiated in some way other than by a separate list. A motion carried to use this procedure in the 1974 Proceedings with sustaining members being designated by bold face type, asterisks or underlining.

A long discussion was held regarding dues, costs and their relationships. This included questioning the need for two classes of memberships—annual and sustaining. Several members expressed the opinion that the general annual membership dues should be sufficient to return operating costs of the Society. A committee was appointed to study these points and make recommendations to the 1975 Executive Committee.

A report was received from the Membership Committee indicating several ways in which membership could be expanded. These included making an analysis of membership, encouraging libraries and organizations to become paying members, strengthening the publicity and promotion regarding the benefits of the Society, planning more roundtables where growers can discuss mutual problems, encouraging student memberships and working through other horticultural organizations.

A report was received from the Industry Award Committee. They suggested in the future the By-Laws should be changed to have six people on the committee, designating one from each section. It was moved, and approved unanimously that the By-Laws reflect this change.

A report was received from the Site Survey Committee indicating the 1975 meeting was contracted for the Dutch Inn and recommending the contract proposal which had been received from the Carillon Hotel, Miami Beach for the 1976 meeting, be approved. They also reminded the Committee that an option is currently held for the 1977 meeting at the Dutch Inn and can be cancelled anytime up to 30 days after

the 1975 meeting. A motion passed unanimously that the contract with the Carillon as the 1976 convention site be executed.

A report was received from the Emmett H. Council Memorial Tomato Award Committee. Their report outlined general guidelines, approved the idea of the award in principle and recommended the first award nominee be selected for presentation at the 1974 annual meeting. After considerable discussion particularly concerning the possibility that the Society may in the future become overburdened with such contributed awards, the motion passed to establish the Council Memorial Tomato Award with two negative votes.

A report was received from the Student Membership Committee. They presented recommendations for guidelines regarding the student memberships and regarding the sponsorship of student attendees at the annual meeting.

The secretary presented a proposed change in By-laws establishing the Nominating and Membership Committee in lieu of the Nominating Committee. The By-laws proposal was approved unanimously by the Executive Committee.

Motions that were carried and important discussions at the third meeting of the Executive Committee, September 20, 1974, at the Carillon Hotel, Miami Beach.

Twelve members were present with Chairman Burt Colburn presiding.

A report was received from the Emmett H. Council Memorial Tomato Award Committee. An addition to the By-Laws was presented establishing this award, outlining the nature and characteristics of the award and describing conditions and qualifications to be met by the recipient. This By-Laws proposal was approved unanimously.

A report was received from the Student Sponsorship Committee and questions were discussed regarding the designation of a committee to handle the contacting, solicitation of funds, maintaining and acknowledging receipt of funds, as well as distribution to students. A motion to refer this to the Executive Committee for 1975 and request they establish a suitable committee to handle this, passed unanimously.

A report was received from the Ad Hoc Committee to study the need to establish a new award for contributors to Florida Agriculture who were not members of FSHS. The Committee recommended no action be taken as this authority was already vested in the Chairman of FSHS when such appropriate occasions arise.

A discussion was held regarding the printing contract. After considerable discussion it was determined the E. O. Painter Printing Company, with an increase of 11% over the previous year's contract should be awarded the contract for 1974. Motion to award this year's printing contract to the E. O. Painter Printing Company passed unanimously.

A report was received from the Secretary regarding the Xerox University Microfilms proposal to microfilm out-of-date volumes of the Proceedings. There would be no charge for the microfilms, one copy would be provided the FSHS and the Society would receive a 10% royalty on all microfilms sold. These would only be made on out-of-date volumes of the Proceedings. A motion that the contract with University Microfilms for this service be approved, passed unanimously.

Motions passed and important discussions of the fourth Executive Committee Meeting, Carillon Hotel, Tuesday, November 5.

A local arrangements committee was appointed by the Chairman, to begin liaison with the staff of the Dutch Inn, Lake Buena Vista, shortly after the beginning of 1975, in preparation for next year's Annual Meeting there.

A discussion was held regarding appointments and composition of the Nominating Committee.

Details of the 1974 meeting were reviewed and final plans completed.

**87th ANNUAL BUSINESS MEETING
November 7, 1974
Miami Beach, Florida**

The meeting was called to order by President Gerald G. Norman at 4:10 p.m.

The Secretary moved adoption of the minutes of the 86th Annual Meeting as published in the Society Proceedings, Volume 86, page 513. The motion was seconded and carried.

The Secretary read the report of the Executive Committee for 1974 and moved its adoption. The motion was seconded and carried. The report is published elsewhere in these Proceedings.

Treasurer Reed presented his report and moved its adoption. The motion was carried. The Treasurer's report as

brought up-to-date through December 31, 1974, is printed elsewhere in these Proceedings.

The membership report was presented by the Secretary who moved its approval. The motion was seconded and carried and the report as up-dated through December 31, 1974, is printed elsewhere in these Proceedings.

The Secretary brought forward three proposed amendments to the By-laws, all of which had prior approval by the Executive Committee. The Secretary first moved adoption of the following text concerning the establishment of a nominating and membership committee. This committee was to replace the current Nominating Committee.

"Nominating and Membership Committee—the President shall appoint a joint Nominating and Membership Committee consisting of not less than two persons from each section, one of whom shall be the most recent past Sectional Vice-President able to serve. This committee shall develop plans for soliciting and promoting new memberships throughout the year and shall make nominations at the Annual Meeting of the officers and other members of the Executive Committee for the ensuing year, provided that the members representing various sections shall seek advice of each section in open meetings concerning the nomination of Vice-president for that section. Such nominations by the committee, however, shall not preclude nominations from the floor. The president shall appoint a member of this joint committee as Chairman." The motion was seconded from the floor and carried unanimously. The Secretary then moved adoption of the second change in the By-laws, to read as follows:

Change the first sentence of the paragraph (3) President's Industry Award Committee to read as follows: "The selection of the paper qualifying for the president's industry award will be made by a committee consisting of at least one member from each section of the Society appointed by the President."

The motion was seconded from the floor and carried without opposition.

The Secretary then moved adoption of the third change in the By-laws, to read as follows:

Under awards following the paragraph on the President's Industry Award Committee add the following: "(4) Council Memorial Tomato Research Award. This award shall be presented based upon \$2,500 donated to the Society by Mrs. Emmett H. Council, Council Farms, Ruskin, Florida. The award shall be continued until the fund and earnings from investments are exhausted. The awards committee shall consist of the Chairman of the Executive Committee, and four other members of the Society appointed at large by the president whose names will not be announced. The award shall be given to the individual or group whose work has the most potential to further the fresh market tomato industry in Florida through advances reported in any single publication in any scientific or technical form. Such publication must have been published during the two previous calendar years. The senior author of the publication upon which the award is based must be an active member of the Florida State Horticultural Society. At the discretion of the chairman, the award may not be presented in any given year when there do

not appear suitable nominees. The award shall consist of a certificate suitably inscribed and \$200 honorarium."

The motion was seconded from the floor and carried unanimously. Nominating Committee Chairman Sal Locascio presented the following list of nominees for officers in the Society for 1975:
