

**REPORT OF THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE  
FLORIDA STATE HORTICULTURAL SOCIETY  
1973**

Five meetings of the Executive Committee were held in 1973.

The first meeting was held January 4 at Lake Alfred, with Chairman R. A. Dennison presiding and 14 members present. Motions that were carried and important discussions were as follows:

1. The desirability of a "student" membership category was extensively discussed, and a motion was passed that the Executive Committee institute a student membership program for 1973 only, under which any person certified as a student by either a major professor or department chairman could become a student member at a cost of one-half the Annual Membership rate, and that continuation of the student membership program would be subject to approval by the membership of the Society at the 1973 annual meeting by amendment of the By-Laws. This motion was carried unanimously.

2. After considering that membership in the Society was essentially static, a motion was made that the Chairman appoint a Membership Committee, predominantly from those previously having served as sectional vice-presidents, and that this committee be asked to update the Society's membership brochure and to conduct a membership campaign. The motion was carried unanimously.

3. A proposal was received from the Carillon Hotel for the site of the 1974 convention. Rates offered were \$1.00 increase in room rate and \$1.00 per person increase in the Modified American Plan. It was moved, seconded, and carried unanimously that the Society accept the Carillon offer for 1974, and that the Chairman appoint a Site Selection Committee and charge it with responsibility for actively and thoroughly investigating possible new sites for the 1975 meeting. At the second meeting, the Secretary announced the signing of the contract with the Carillon for 1974.

4. A report was received from the Committee on Formulation of Program and Publications. The committee recommended that 15 minutes be allocated for presentation of a paper; that page allocation be reduced to 5 pages total, and that all pages in excess of this would be charged to authors or their institutions at the rate of \$35.00 per page; that each section be allowed publication of up to 30 papers per section, but that the Society would not assume an obligation to publish papers judged not to be up to Florida State Horticultural Society standards after receipt of the final paper, and that papers not printed in full could be printed in abstract only; that a discussion session of 5 to 10 minutes be scheduled to allow additional questions at the end of each 3 to 4 papers presented; that in sections where more than 30 papers were offered, each author would be allowed a maximum of 3 papers per volume, of which he could not be senior author of more than 2. A motion was made, seconded, and carried unanimously to accept the committee's recommendations.

5. A proposal was received to institute a new award for the purpose of recognizing the best paper presented by a representative of the horticultural industry. A motion was made that the Chairman appoint a committee to study this question and report to the Executive Committee. The motion was carried unanimously.

6. A motion was made to increase the salary of the Society Clerk by 5%, effective January 1, 1973. The motion passed unanimously.

7. A proposal was offered to solicit industry sources of funds for the purpose of sponsoring the attendance of students at the Society's annual meeting. A motion was made that the President appoint a committee to formulate guidelines for the selection of such students. The motion passed unanimously.

The second meeting of the Executive Committee was held April 5 at Lake Alfred. President Burt Colburn presided in the absence of Chairman Ray Dennison. Thirteen members of the Executive Committee were present.

1. The Membership Committee reported its progress on revision of the Society's membership brochure. A motion was made to approve the general format suggested by the committee, and to encourage the committee to continue its work. This motion passed unanimously.

2. The Student Sponsorship Committee reported encouraging progress on the program. It was moved that the co-operating industry firms be asked to contribute \$100.00 toward a Patron Membership in the Society, with the funds to be used in the Student Sponsorship program. It was further recommended that in the initial year, student selection be turned over to appropriate IFAS Main Station department heads, but that if the student program were adopted by the membership by change in By-Laws at the annual meeting, selection of students would be broadened to include nomina-

tions from the membership; and that student recipients would be expected to give a report to a sponsor and to give a report to fellow students at his institution. It was further decided to give the student a membership and registration as part of his award. A motion to adopt the recommendation carried unanimously.

3. A motion to authorize the Local Arrangements Committee to expend up to \$500.00 for the Ladies' Program carried unanimously.

4. A motion was made to set the registration fee at \$5.00 for all members of the Society and \$3.00 for ladies, and the motion carried unanimously.

The third meeting of the Executive Committee was held at Lake Buena Vista on June 15. The meeting was called to order by Chairman R. A. Dennison, with 12 members of the Executive Committee present.

The Secretary presented a report of the Site Selection Committee, which recommended serious consideration of the Dutch Inn at Lake Buena Vista as a possible site for the 1975 convention. The Chairman had called this special meeting of the Executive Committee to view the facilities and consider the contract offer of the Dutch Inn. After extensive discussion of the proposal, a motion was made, seconded, and carried unanimously to accept the Dutch Inn proposal for 1975.

After discussion of the available dates, the Chairman ruled that the dates of Tuesday, November 4, to Friday, November 7, 1975, would be accepted.

The fourth meeting of the Executive Committee was held at the Carillon Hotel in Miami Beach, October 5. The meeting was called to order by Chairman R. A. Dennison, with 13 members of the Executive Committee present.

1. Further progress was reported by the Membership Committee on revision of the membership brochure. A motion was passed unanimously to approve the Membership Committee's plans for the new membership brochure, subject to the resolution of Student Membership status at the annual meeting.

2. A motion was passed unanimously that the Society purchase 5,000 copies of the new membership brochure.

3. The Industry Award Committee presented a proposed text for an amendment to the By-Laws, establishing the President's Industry Award Committee. A motion was carried unanimously, and the By-Law revision will be presented at a later time in this annual meeting.

4. The Outstanding Student Award Committee reported that a list of 6 students had been designated to attend the 1973 meeting under this program, and that 7 sponsors (or Patron Members) had been attracted to this program. A motion was made that the Chairman of the Executive Committee appoint for future years a committee of 6 to the Student Sponsorship Committee, whose term would initially be for 3, 2, and 1-year duration, and that after one cycle would be of 3-year duration, to formulate program and policies for the student sponsorship program and to recommend, if necessary, any changes in the By-Laws. The motion carried unanimously.

5. The Secretary presented information received from Lt. Gov. Tom Adams concerning participation of the Florida State Horticultural Society in the 1976 American Revolution Bicentennial. A motion was passed that the Society take note of the Bicentennial Celebration by inserting or adding appropriate literature and comments in its mail distributions in 1976. The motion was passed unanimously.

6. The Secretary reported on behalf of the Publications Secretary that bids for printing the 1973 Proceedings had been solicited from 6 Florida printing firms, and that the best bid received was from the E. O. Painter Printing Company, DeLeon Springs, Florida. A motion was made and passed unanimously that the E. O. Painter bid be accepted.

7. Honorary memberships were considered by the Executive Committee. Four candidates were elected. The names of these candidates will be announced at the annual banquet.

8. President Colburn announced appointment of the Nominating Committee, with C. N. Smith as Chairman.

9. The Secretary proposed revision of the By-Laws to include the category "Annual Membership (Student)." A motion to establish this category of dues was carried unanimously and the proposed change in By-Laws will be presented to the membership at a later time in this annual meeting.

10. President-elect L. C. Hammond of the Florida Soil and Crop Science Society discussed the merits of a joint meeting between the two societies. Since discussion failed to develop a consensus, the Chairman appointed a committee to further consider the matter and report its findings at the next meeting of the Executive Committee.

The fifth meeting of the Executive Committee was held at the Carillon Hotel on November 6, 1973. In the absence of Chairman Ray Dennison, President Burt Colburn presided, and 13 members of the Executive Committee were present.

1. A motion was passed to utilize E. A. Menninger's mailing list in a solicitation of membership.

2. A motion was passed to award the bid on the new membership brochure to E. O. Painter Printing Co. of DeLeon Springs, and to increase the number ordered to 10,000 copies.

3. The committee to consider coordination of an annual meeting with the Florida Soil and Crop Science Society reported favorably toward a concurrent meeting in 1974, but a motion to implement the committee's report failed to pass.

4. A proposal was received to establish a new award in the tomato research area. A motion was passed to approve the idea in principle and recommend to the 1974 Executive Committee that a special committee be appointed to work out a detailed proposal.

5. A recommendation was made to the 1974 Executive Committee that the By-Laws be changed to provide that the Society's Membership Committee and Nominating Committee consist each year of the previous year's Sectional Vice-Presidents, with the chairman to be appointed by the Chairman of the Executive Committee.

6. A motion was passed that with prior approval of the Executive Committee, invited speakers would not be required to become members of the Society.

7. A motion was passed recommending to the 1974 Executive Committee that it consider the desirability of establishing a new award for the recognition of service to horticulture outside the Society's regular activities.

**86TH ANNUAL BUSINESS MEETING**  
November 8, 1973  
Miami Beach, Florida

The meeting was called to order by President Burt E. Colburn at 4:10 p.m.

The Secretary moved adoption of the minutes of the 85th Annual Meeting as published in the Society Proceedings, Volume 85, Page 444. The motion was seconded and carried.

The Secretary read the report of the Executive Committee for 1973 and moved its adoption. The motion was seconded and carried. The report is published elsewhere in these Proceedings.

Treasurer Reed presented his report and moved its adoption. The motion was carried. The Treasurer's report, as brought up to date through December 31, 1973, is printed elsewhere in these Proceedings.

The membership report was presented by the Secretary, who moved its approval. The motion was seconded and carried, and the report as updated to December 31, 1973, is printed elsewhere in these Proceedings.

The Secretary brought forward two proposed amendments to the By-Laws, both of which had had prior approval by the Executive Committee. The Secretary first moved adoption of the following text concerning dues:

"Dues—dues shall be paid annually for the current year and shall be payable to the Treasurer of the Society. Dues shall be as follows:

The motion was seconded from the floor and carried unanimously.

The Secretary then moved adoption of the second change in the By-Laws, to read as follows:

"(3) President's Industry Award Committee.—The selection of the paper qualifying for the President's Industry Award will be made by a three-member committee appointed by the President. The award will be presented to the author of the single best paper given at the Florida State Horticultural Society's annual meeting by an industry author. An industry author is defined as anyone other than a staff member of an academic institution or a government agency. In those instances where there are both senior and junior authors, the senior author of the paper must be a member of the Society. Any paper which receives recognition as the best paper in a Section will also be eligible for the President's Industry Award if other qualifications

are met. The award shall consist of a plaque suitably inscribed and presented at the President's discretion." The motion was seconded from the floor and carried without opposition.
