

Information for Contributors

Original papers on basic, applied, or experimental nematology are considered for publication. Other categories include reviews (focus will be on current literature and work on a specific area of research, teaching, or extension) and abstracts of papers presented at the annual meetings. Routine surveys of nematode distribution or of germplasm collections for susceptibility to parasitic nematodes are not acceptable unless it can be demonstrated that the data make a unique contribution to the literature. Surveys of a more fundamental nature that test or generate hypotheses are encouraged. It is expected that critical experiments be repeated in time or space, or valid arguments presented for not doing so. Nonmembers of the Society of Nematologists are encouraged to submit their work to the *Journal of Nematology*.

Manuscripts: All manuscripts will be in English. Authors are encouraged to submit manuscripts electronically. Manuscripts must be Word (.doc or .rtf) or WordPerfect (.wpd) files. Compose all tables using the table making feature of the word processing program. All figures (line art, photos, and micrographs) must be submitted as separate .tif or .eps files (identified by first author's name and figure number). Do not embed figures in the body of the manuscript. Double-space all text, including literature citations, tables, and figure legends. Do not justify right margin of text. Before submission, manuscripts must be reviewed critically by two colleagues and their names included in the letter of submission. If submitted as a printed copy, send original and three high-quality photocopies. All manuscripts are submitted to the Editor-in-chief with the understanding that publication is to be exclusively in the *Journal of Nematology*. Papers will be reviewed by specialists in the field and edited by selected editors.

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Style: The JON Author's Publication Handbook and Style Manual, CBE Scientific Style and Format Manual, 6th ed., and Webster's Third New International Dictionary will be guides for form, style, and spelling. Use SI (International System) units of measurement. Author(s) name(s) and page number should appear in the upper right-hand corner of each page, except for the title page. The title page is page 1 but is not numbered, the abstract is page 2, the first page of text is page 3, etc. The JON Author's Publication Handbook and Style Manual is available on the SON Home Page or upon request from the Editor-in-Chief (website: <http://www.nematologists.org>).

Title page: Include the title, name(s) of author(s), a line over the notation "Received for publication," footnote(s) giving institutional affiliation(s), first author's current address (if not the same), acknowledgments (if any), e-mail address, and a condensed running head of no more than 60 characters including spaces (including author's last name in italics). The title should use strong key words and be brief, preferably not more than 100 characters including spaces. Scientific names of plants and animals should be given. Trade names of chemicals or common names of nematodes should not be used in the title. Include corresponding author's name, address, phone and fax numbers, and e-mail address at the top of the title page.

Abstract page: Should contain no more than 1,300 characters including spaces and key words. Key words should include those appearing in the title. The abstract serves as the summary.

Body: The organization of the manuscript body should be as follows: introduction (do not use the word "introduction"), MATERIALS AND METHODS, RESULTS, DISCUSSION, LITERATURE CITED, TABLES, LEGENDS FOR FIGURES,

and Figures. Authors of taxonomic papers should follow the format specified in the *Journal of Nematology* 21:444-445.

Literature citations: Cite by the name-year system in the text. Begin Literature Cited on a separate page. Arrange citations alphabetically by senior author. Journal names must be spelled out in full. The citation format for *Annals* articles published in 1987-88 is *Annals of Applied Nematology* (*Journal of Nematology* 19 or 20, Supplement) 1:00-00 or 2:00-00. Beginning with the 1989 issue the citation format is Supplement to the *Journal of Nematology* vol:pp-pp.

Tables: Number (Arabic) each table and place on a separate page with descriptive title at the top. Footnotes should be identified by a lower-case superscript letter starting with ^a. Do not use vertical lines. Table dimensions should fit within the printed page-size.

Figure legends: Begin figure legends on a separate page with the heading, Legend for Figures. Number the legends consecutively.

Figures: Number (Arabic) all figures on the front top right-hand corner with author's name, figure number, and printed dimension desired. Combine and mount several illustrations into composite plates whenever possible. Do not leave spaces between photographs in a composite. Lettering on illustrations should be of high contrast and at least 1 mm high after final reduction. One-column width is 85 mm; 2-column width is 170 mm. Remember that a printed page is 170 mm wide x240 mm deep; make allowance for the figure legend. Avoid submitting illustrations larger than 230 mm x300 mm, including margins. Do not send original illustrations of taxonomic papers until the revised copy is submitted, but provide a complete set of figures with each manuscript copy (if possible, use laser color photocopier to make copies). Number all figures consecutively, e.g., Figs. 1A,B,C,2,3, etc. Color illustrations and folded inserts can be printed only if the extra costs are paid by the author. Digital images should be separate Tiff or EPS files.

Biological nomenclature: Authors should follow the International Code of Zoological Nomenclature in naming organisms; each should be identified by genus, species, authority (if applicable), cultivar names (in single quotes), breeds, races, and accession numbers. Complete authorities and dates are required in taxonomic papers. All binomials should be underlined or italicized and fully spelled out the first time they are used in text, figure captions, and table titles. When new names of nematodes are introduced, the recommendations of the International Code of Zoological Nomenclature (1985) should be strictly applied, especially regarding type designations and statements indicating where such type material is deposited.

Genetic nomenclature: Authors naming strains, genes, alleles, loci identified as DNA polymorphisms, and molecular clones should follow the guidelines specified in vol. 26, pp. 138-143 of the *Journal*. Chemical nomenclature: Use approved common (generic) names where available; otherwise use capitalized trade names followed by their ingredients. Chemical doses should be reported as amount of active or technical material per unit area, volume, or weight. The chemical formulation should be given and method of application stated clearly.

Publishing page charge: The Society of Nematologists has established a charge of \$80 per page to partially offset the cost of publishing manuscripts.

Offprints: Quotation and an order form for offprints and eprints will be sent with page proofs.

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
