NOTES ON TENSE AND ASPECT IN THE IJESA DIALECT OF YORUBA

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Ijeșa is a dialect of Yoruba in which there are three aspect markings—progressive, habitual, and perfective—and one tense marking—future. Tense/aspect marking in the Ijeșa dialect differs from that found in Standard Yoruba. Consider first aspectual marking. The progressive in Ijeșa is marked by mi rather than the n of Standard Yoruba, as shown in (1).

(1) Ijesa	Standard Yoruba
a. <i>Mọ mí lọó roko.</i> ¹ I PROG go farm 'I am going to the farm.'	Mo ń lọ sí roko. to
b. <i>Adé mí jeun.</i> Ade PROG eat 'Ade is eating.'	Adé ń jęun.
c. <i>Mọ ti mí ṣusẹ́.</i> I PF PROG do_work 'I have been working.'	Mo ti ń șișé.

In imperative constructions, such as those shown in (2), Ijeşa allows either the bare verb (2a) or progressive marker a plus verb (2b-c). Standard Yoruba, on the other hand, requires the auxiliary $m\dot{a}a$ and does not permit use of either the bare verb or the progressive form. Ijeşa a is a reduced form of $m\dot{a}a$, which no longer occurs as a progressive marker in this form in Ijeşa.

The habitual is marked by a vowel that assimilates to the preceding vowel in Ijesa, but by máa \dot{n} in Standard Yoruba, as in (3).

Future tense marking also differs in the two dialects. In Ijeşa, it is marked by either a or \dot{a} , in contrast to the variant forms $y\dot{o}$, $y\dot{o}$, \dot{o} , or $m\dot{a}a$ in Standard Yoruba.

- (4) Ijesa
 - a. Mà a ga. I FUT tall 'I will become tall.'
 - b. Supo á lọ. Supo FUT go 'Supo will go.'

Standard Yoruba Olú yóò/yó/ó sòrò. Olu FUT talk 'Olu will talk.'

Olú máa sòrò. Olu FUT talk 'Olu will talk.'

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
